

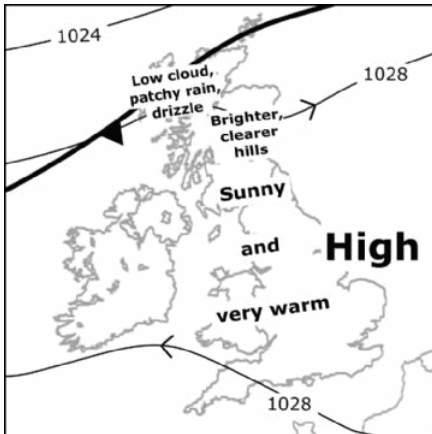
Peak District

General Summary for Monday, 25 May, 2026



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 25 May, 2026

High pressure brings another extensively sunny and unseasonably hot day for England and Wales, with valley temperatures from Peak District into Wales up to 30C in afternoon. Also very warm sunshine southern and eastern Scotland, but still blustery south-westerly with low cloud and patchy drizzly rain northwest Scotland.

Headline for Peak District

Sunny and becoming unseasonably hot. Beware of dehydration and sunburn.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 25 May, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South to south-westerly 10mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Dry
Cloud on the hills?	Hills clear Any early patches of mist will quickly disperse.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Almost certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Widespread and strong sunshine. Good visibility, but slight haze.
Temperature (at 600m)	23C, very humid
And in the valleys	Increasingly hot with valley temperatures reaching 27 to 30C.

Peak District - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 26 May	Wednesday 27 May
How windy? (On the summits)	Varying in direction, 5-10mph; perhaps flat calm for periods.	Southeasterly 15 to 20mph, but perhaps 30mph at times as marked gusts develop, with highest gusts not always on tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible	May well be rather blustery and increasingly gusty through the day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Risk isolated afternoon thunderstorm Very likely dry, but risk of cloud bubbling up in the afternoon to give an isolated, but should they occur, slow-moving heavy shower or thunderstorm.	No rain expected
Cloud on the hills?	None expected Any ribbons of mist from dawn will soon disperse.	Areas of low cloud, lifting off hills. Patches of banks of low cloud cover hills for a time in the morning, mostly eastern hills. Will lift and break up to leave hills clear by afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Greater than 90%	60% lifting to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Widespread sunshine, but areas of cloud will bubble up in the afternoon. Visibility mostly good or very good, but slight haze.	May be a dull start, but a patchwork of sunshine developing. Visibility good but a marked haze.
Temperature (at 600m)	18 to 20C, humid	15 to 17C, highest early in the day.
And in the valleys	Valley temperature rising to 24 to 27C	20 to 23C, highest western hills.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 26 May, 2026**

High pressure dominates this week with early patchy low cloud, mainly coastal hills dispersing to give widespread warm or very warm sunshine, still reaching into the high 20s on Tuesday Peak District into Wales with high humidity, which may spark off the odd thunderstorm, before peak daytime temperatures come down a little, when cooler for eastern hills. Chance of well scattered shower development from midweek as a gusty south-easterly develops for western hills. Pressure lowering next weekend into next week.
