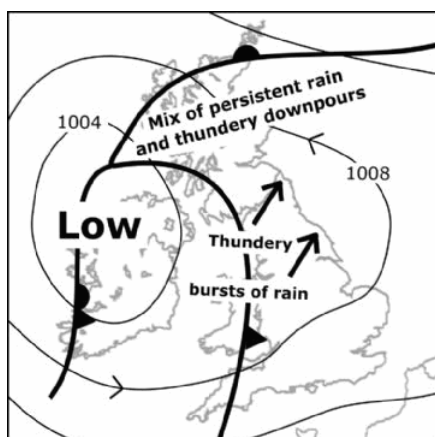
The southernmost Pennines, covering the entire Peak District National Park, also extending north to hills accessed from Hebden Bridge, and including the hills immediately north of Manchester.

General Summary for Tuesday, 4 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 4 August, 2026

Extensive rain and low cloud across Scotland, becoming thundery downpours into the afternoon from the south into the Highlands. For England & Wales, rain and low cloud most persistent in the morning, heavy showery bursts in middle of day tending to clear eastward afternoon. Strong and gusty winds widely.

Headline for Peak District

Thundery bursts of rain for a time. Breezy. Warm and humid.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 4 August, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South turning southwesterly 20mph, at times 25mph over higher areas, gusty around showers.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but feeling breezy in exposure, occasional more noticeable gusts near showers.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers, some heavy bursts, risk thunder Pulses of showery rain extending northeastward across the area morning into middle of day, some heavier thundery bursts for a time into early afternoon, tending to clear eastward to leave isolated heavy showers locally into evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Tending to clear Varied banks of cloud over higher terrain in the morning, tending to rise above most hills, but some ragged patches return for periods in showers. More often clear later afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of sunshine, developing more often later in day. Hazy, and visibility poor in rain, improving to become increasingly very good later.
Temperature (at 600m)	17C, rising to 20C afternoon, humid.
And in the valleys	16C from dawn, rising to 24C in afternoon.

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 5 August, 2026

Low pressure over the country during midweek brings strong winds, rain and thundery showers. Trending toward westerlies later in the week and into weekend, by then most rain and low cloud in western Scotland, but showery rain elsewhere at times, accompanied by periods of strong to gale force mountain winds at times. Generally fresh temperatures widely, often in mid-single figures over Scottish high tops. Despite falls of rain, beware of ongoing fire management restricting access to hills locally.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2026.
