


# Snowdonia National Park

## General Summary for Wednesday, 15 September, 2021



### British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 15 September, 2021

Light wind across the country. However, in a fairly humid air mass - with a weak front reaching western Scotland - low cloud will be extensive at first although many summits will clear. Here and there showers, but rain on and off near Loch Linnhe and coastal NW Highlands.

#### Headline for Snowdonia National Park

Light wind; risk of a shower. Low cloud gradually clearing.

## Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 15 September, 2021

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Direction varied 10mph or less.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Negligible</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Risk one or two bursts of rain</b> Very likely dry. However, risk of one or two showers, probably brief.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>  <b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Most or all summits clearing; may sometimes form near the coast</b> Post dawn, patches of fog, from lower slopes up. Will improve through morning as patches of fog, from lower slopes up, mostly lift to clear the summits, particularly east Wales. Near the coast, patches of very low cloud, perhaps below 300m, may come and go. <b>80% from midday</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine, most widely east Wales. Good visibility although a haze.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>	11C
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits

## Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 16 September	Friday 17 September
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>  <b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	West later southwesterly 10mph.  <b>Negligible.</b>	Southerly 25 to 35mph morning, strongest west Wales. Will tend to drop to or perhaps below 20mph though daylight. <b>Significant buffering on higher western areas morning, but likely to become small.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Rain not expected</b>	<b>Occasional rain, mainly west</b>  Very likely dry at first, and probably most or all day east Wales. However, rain over the sea to the west of Wales, will probably from time to time extend onto western mountains.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>  <b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Most summits clearing</b>  Widespread cloud across the hills after dawn; mainly on western hills, the cloud forming on lower slopes. Will progressively improve, by about midday, most or all summits will be cloud free, although cloud may come and go on above 950m. <b>80%</b>	<b>Very little</b>  Mountains substantially cloud free. However, in rain, patches may form on highest western summits.  <b>70%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of sun; most extensive sun east Wales. Excellent visibility by about midday.	Pockets of sunshine, mainly east Wales. Hazy.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>  <b>Freezing Level</b>	9C  Above the summits.	10C  Above the summits.

## Planning Outlook

### All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 16 September, 2021

On Friday, a weakening Atlantic front will bring in rain (mainly to the W & NW Highlands), and stronger winds to western mountains.

As yet detailed confidence not high for the weekend and early next week. There will be a build of pressure following Friday's rain to give substantially fine weather, but the remnants of fronts may still give one or two 'poor' periods, with low cloud and occasional rain.
