

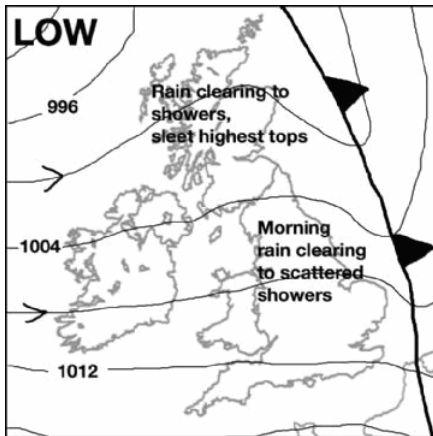

General Summary for Monday, 27 September, 2021



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 27 September, 2021

Residual heavy rain and low cloud from overnight will clear east in morning. Chiller conditions follow to all areas with a gusty southwesterly wind and showers; most frequent across Wales and also western Scotland where they will fall as sleet on the highest munros.

Headline for Snowdonia National Park

Frequent showers with cloud often covering tops. Blustery.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 27 September, 2021

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25 to 35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Increasingly blustery with conditions fairly arduous with considerable wind chill and buffeting.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Frequent showers Any residual heavy rain in the east soon clearing after dawn. Showers will then become frequent for a few hours with the risk of hail and thunder.
Cloud on the hills?	Frequently covering tops. Cloud will very likely frequently cover the tops in fog, particularly across the Snowdon Range. Best of the breaks will be across east Wales.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional patches of sun. Visibility good or very good, but slight haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	5C
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 28 September	Wednesday 29 September
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Low confidence in detail: Southwesterly in the range 20 to 35mph, risk 45mph for a few hours in afternoon higher slopes. Be prepared for arduous conditions across the hills for several hours with considerable wind chill and buffeting.	Northwesterly 25 to 35mph will ease to around 15 to 25mph into the afternoon. Fairly arduous through the morning with significant buffeting and wind chill, easing by midday.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Frequent pulses of rain, may ease later. Frequent pulses of rain moving in from the west with some heavy falls and a risk of thunder. Showers may ease in intensity and frequency through the afternoon.	Showers, most frequent morning Showers will run in from the northwest, these frequent and heavy for a few hours in the morning when risk of thunder.
Cloud on the hills?	Becoming fairly extensive higher slopes. Cloud likely covering the hills fairly frequently through the day above around 600-800m. Best breaks east Wales, and perhaps also further west later.	Fairly extensive on tops. Cloud capping higher tops fairly extensively for several hours, especially across Snowdon Range where may linger all day.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy. Visibility often poor due to rain, may become very good later.	Frequently cloudy, but some patches of sun breaking through occasionally. Visibility very good, but poor in showers.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	5C Above the summits	4C Above the summits

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 28 September, 2021**

An unsettled and windy period of weather over the next 7 to 10 days with frequent areas of low pressure bringing bouts of upland gales or severe gales and rain; large falls accumulating across western hills. Chillier than of late, some days near freezing on higher Scottish tops with sleet and wet snow at times on the highest Munros.
