


Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Tuesday, 1 August, 2023



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 1 August, 2023

Between areas of low pressure, something of an improvement, although little sunshine, and near the remnants of fronts (simplified on map) patches of rain and low cloud much of N England and S Scotland. The wind will become light north from Lake District/N Pennines.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Wind easing; becoming dry, cloud base rising.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 1 August, 2023

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 30mph, perhaps 35mph on higher tops, dropping to 20 to 25mph afternoon. Will later back southerly with a temporary lull in speed.
Effect of wind on you?	Significant buffeting higher slopes, particularly Snowdon range for several hours, before becoming fairly small.
How wet?	Drizzly showers fizzling out Drizzly showers morning, mainly at first. Eastern mountains substantially dry. Turning wet from after dusk.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive morning; cloud becoming confined to higher tops Higher areas extensively covered most or all day, and for several hours from dawn cloud will often shroud lower slopes west Wales. Overall improving, by mid afternoon, most cloud above 650m, perhaps eventually above 800m east Wales (north from Berwyn mountains) and Tryfan/Carneddau area.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10% morning to 40% late afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun, mainly east Wales. Misty in rain, and generally hazy, although visibility becoming excellent as haze thins.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8C, slowly rising to 10C, initially east Wales. In morning directly in the wind, will feel colder than freezing point on higher tops.

	Wednesday 2 August	Thursday 3 August
How windy? (On the summits)	Very varied as a deep low crosses S Britain. Varied wind direction, often 30 to sometimes above 40mph, but possible	North to northwesterly 20 to on higher summits, 25mph. Perhaps 30mph on higher tops Snowdon to Tryfan and Carneddau.
Effect of wind on you?	Anticipate challenging conditions; sudden gusts for periods even on lower slopes could blow you over. Significant wind chill.	Mostly fairly small, although will impede ease of walking on higher areas, particularly Snowdon range.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Frequently raining Rain intermittently as bands of rain or sometimes heavy showers with small risk thunder, come through.	Drizzly rain on and off Intermittently dry, but pulses of drizzly rain and briefer showers, particularly Snowdon range. Particularly in the morning substantially dry well inland.
Cloud on the hills?	Mountains frequently foggy Will vary through day, but overall hills extensively covered in fog, sometimes from lower slopes up. Breaks in the low cloud may well be fairly brief.	Mountains extensively foggy Cloud base varying between 350 and occasionally 600m near the coast. Elsewhere, cloud sometimes below 600m in rain, but generally 700m, occasionally higher. Generally lowest cloud base when raining.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A little sunshine now and again. Hazy, and for periods misty or murky in rain.	Little or no sunshine. Particularly near the coast, persistent haze, and visibility poor at times in rain. Elsewhere, visibility mostly very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C, but will feel as cold as minus 3C directly in the wind.	8C; marginally less cold well inland.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 2 August, 2023**

Little change in the weather on the mountains: rain at some stage most days, extensive fog and relatively chilly (particularly Friday).

However, the Scottish Highlands will largely or completely miss heavy rain and strong to gale force upland winds on Wednesday. A further bout of rain and wind over the weekend may not extend north of Wales.
