

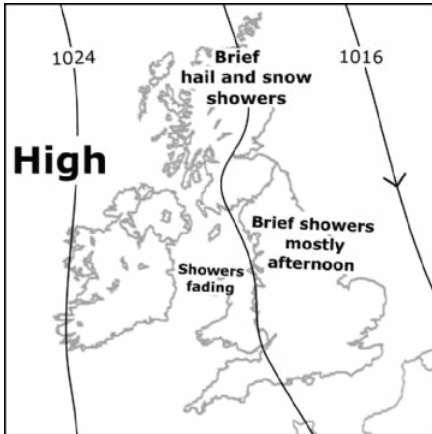

General Summary for Tuesday, 11 June, 2024



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 11 June, 2024

Staying chilly across the mountains, but a gradual lift of temperature above freezing toward highest tops. Northerly winds fairly light but still a distinct chill in the air. A scattering of brief showers with hail, but a lot of dry weather with very clear air and cloud clearing most tops.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Chilly breeze. Scattered brief showers.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 11 June, 2024

How windy? (On the summits)	Northwest or northerly 15mph, but on western summits for periods 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Small; although in the low temperatures will feel particularly cold in the wind.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Hail showers Showers, mostly brief, of hail or above 800m snow. Well inland few showers until late morning or midday.
Cloud on the hills?	Frequently clearing nearly all higher summits Near showers fragments of cloud below 700m, but mostly above 800 or 900m. Otherwise, patches on higher slopes now and again but summits extensively cloud free.
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of bright sunshine, particularly well inland morning. Inland cloud will tend to fill in from about midday. Excellent or well inland superb visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	2C post dawn; rising marginally near the coast, but inland in mid Wales 5C by mid-afternoon. Wind chill feeling like -4C morning, still sub-zero high tops in afternoon.
Freezing Level	Above the summits, although risk slight frost mainly upland valleys at first.

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 12 June	Thursday 13 June
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 10 to 15mph or less.	Southerly, 30 to 45mph, risk strengthening quickly, at times over 50mph on higher mountains in Snowdon range.
Effect of wind on you?	Small	Deteriorating, making walking arduous, considerable buffeting on exposed higher mountains. Gusts may knock you over.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Precipitation unlikely Small chance of an isolated brief shower.	Rain setting in Possibly dry for a few hours early morning, but risk of rain soon moving in from the west, setting in persistently, heavy for several hours on western mountains.
Cloud on the hills?	Very little Summits extensively cloud free, although cloud may shroud higher tops near the coast until mid or late morning.	Varied, local breaks; lowering in rain Banks of cloud over hills in the morning, but some breaks, best north of the A5 for a time. Cloud base lowering across the hills as rain develops, forming to midslopes, or lower near coast.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	50% dropping to 10% in rain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloud gradually filling in, but then during afternoon sunshine near to coasts will later gradually extend inland from west. Superb visibility.	Cloud thickening from west to be overcast and dull. Good visibility at first reducing to poor in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	2C rising to 5 to 8C, coldest on summits nearest to the coast.	4 to 6C. Feeling sub-zero in the wind, below -5C as speeds increase.
Freezing Level	Above the summits but slight frost some upland and lowland valleys at dawn.	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 12 June, 2024

Cold conditions will ease through midweek and winds will drop lighter. Low pressure approaching from the southwest by Thursday will see winds switch south to southeasterly and strengthen to gale force over west coastal mountains. Rain will move in from the west, becoming heavy. An unsettled outlook into the weekend and early next week as low pressure circulates slowly over the British Isles, bringing areas of rain and thundery showers. Wind speed and direction will vary, at times strong easterlies northern Scotland, west to southwesterly for Wales and Pennines. Temperatures will be higher, above freezing to tops, but not especially warm.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Monday, 10 June, 2024
