

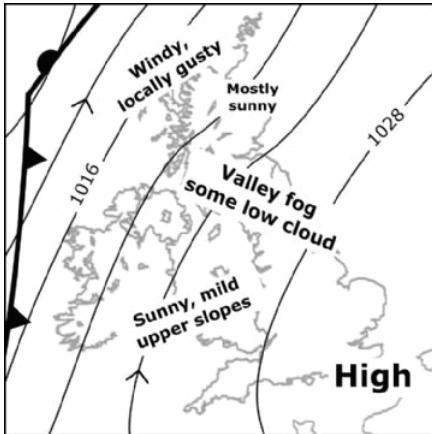

General Summary for Saturday, 18 January, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 18 January, 2025

Southerly winds strongest toward northwest Scotland, locally very gusty. A fine day overall, with plentiful sunshine across the tops, in places above an inversion with banks of low cloud and fog on lower and some mid-elevation slopes, mostly on south-facing hills.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Mostly sunny, patchy fog banks. Light to moderate wind.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 18 January, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 15 to 20mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No precipitation expected
Cloud on the hills?	Probably very little after the morning Any morning cloud in the valleys will soon evaporate. High ground likely to be largely cloud free.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80% (above fog in places)
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine. Hazy low down but superb visibility on high ground.
How Cold? (at 900m)	5 to 7C above inversion, but significantly cooler on lower slopes.
Freezing Level	Above the summits but near or below freezing on lower ground initially.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly 10-20mph. Turning southwest and rising slightly. Gusty on lower terrain up to 30mph. Minimal effects, through gusts on lower terrain may cause moments of imbalance.	Westerly 10-20mph. Fairly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Brief spells of drizzle southwest Isolated spells of light drizzle possible on mountains near Llyn Peninsula. Otherwise dry.	Showery rain west Occasional showery rain, primarily in the west. Possibility of frequent rain, but total amounts likely small.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	High terrain clear Fog and frequent low cloud banks on south and west facing slopes. Cloud tops staying near 800m. Cloud banks coming and going on northeast hills. 30%, 80% above 800m	Hills frequently shrouded. Low clouds will shroud most hills and mountain tops. Fog patches possible in protected valleys. Occasional breaks possible. 20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Widely sunny above 800m, patchy sun on most northeast slopes. Excellent visibility of out cloud.	Little chance of sun. Mostly poor visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	3C. A rapid drop to near 1C near highest summits around midday, then warming again near dusk. Above the summits	2C Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 19 January, 2025

Slow changes in the days ahead as high pressure to the southeast slowly fades and allows weak fronts to make inroads from the west. Small amounts of precipitation until later next week - patchy drizzle in places, locally snow flurries developing as temperature falls slowly. South to southeasterly winds prevailing, locally very gusty, bringing areas of low cloud or fog - at times higher slopes clear above the cloud. Sunniest overall toward north of major hill groups. Deeper areas of low pressure over the Atlantic are expected toward late January, bringing a risk of more frequent precipitation and periods of gales or possibly stormy winds at times; fluctuating temperatures and freeze-thaw cycles.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Friday, 17 January, 2025
