

General Summary for Tuesday, 11 February, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 11 February, 2025

Windy and cold with most mountain terrain frozen. Snow will accumulate slowly over many eastern mountains although rain lower slopes Scottish Borders southwards. A few flurries will reach western mountains, where in places cloud will break to give a little sunshine.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Snow furries, mainly east. Higher terrain frozen.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 11 February, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Northeasterly; typically 15mph but sometimes 20mph higher tops N Wales. Mostly 10mph mid Wales.	
Effect of wind on you?	Small.	
How wet?	Risk snow flurries	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Extensively dry but risk of snow flurries (light rain lower slopes), mainly east Wales.	
Cloud on the hills?	Most summits cloud covered	
	Persistent fog east and mid Wales above about 450 to in afternoon 600m. The cloud mostly above 700m toward the Snowdon range and could lift to 900m or break up occasionally.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little or no sunshine although some sun on slopes nearest the coast. Mostly good visibility although a haze.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	-3C	
Freezing Level	600m.

How wet?	Precipitation unlikely	Substantially or completely dry
(Precipitation and its impact)	Risk isolated snow flurries.	Small risk of a little light snow.
Cloud on the hills?	Becoming confined to or above higher tops	Clearing most summits: highest summits may not clearing
	Cloud base may be around 450 to 600m at least in east Wales from dawn. May well improve, perhaps markedly, in the afternoon most cloud above 750 to 900m - possibly clearing higher tops.	Cloud base typically 750-900m, generally lowest east Wales. May well frequently lift above summits north from Cader Idris.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50%	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of sun developing, mainly west Wales. Good visibility but a haze.	Occasional sun. Good visibility although a haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C, may rise to 0C.	-4C. Due to wind chill will feel around -13C.
Freezing Level	600m, possibly rising as high as 900m (poorly defined freezing level as temperature drops only slowly with	500m.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 12 February, 2025

Remaining cold with nearly all mountain terrain frozen for the next week or perhaps longer. Total precipitation will be small, although one or two further periods where snow showers or flurries will reach mainly eastern mountains, whilst occasionally winds strengthen and a threat of precipitation on western mountains as Atlantic fronts temporarily make progress toward western Britain.
