

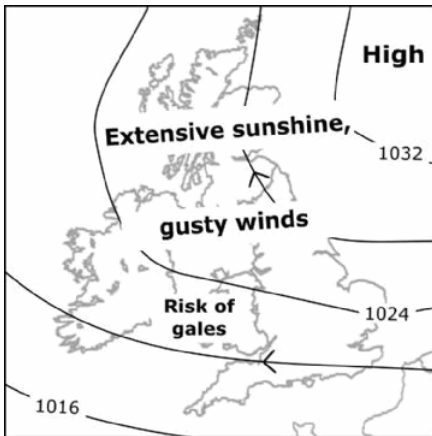
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Wednesday, 2 April, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 2 April, 2025

Dry and widely sunny. Low slopes and valleys near east coasts may see patchy dawn mist, some reaching higher terrain in England, though soon dissipating. A gusty breeze in all areas, notably along Scotland's west coast and down western slopes in England and Wales. Strongest winds in Wales with a risk of gales in the morning.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Strong gusty winds, risk of gales. Dry and sunny.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 2 April, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Easterly 30-35mph, strongest winds in the morning. Considerable gusts through elevated valleys and down western slopes, risk up to 45mph on coastal mountains of mid-Wales.
Effect of wind on you?	Balance and stability affected in high winds, arduous in highest gusts with considerable buffeting. Significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No precipitation
Cloud on the hills?	No cloud
Chance of cloud free summits?	Nearly certain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive sunshine. Visibility very good, slight haze east.
How Cold? (at 900m)	4C, rising to 6C Feeling like -5C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits. Slight frost inland valleys at dawn.

	Thursday 3 April	Friday 4 April
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Easterly 25-30mph, gusts to 45mph around major summits, through elevated passes, locally downslope to the west. Affecting comfortable walking and balance on exposed terrain, sudden powerful gusts not just on highest ground. Feeling chilly.	Easterly 25-35mph. Strong gusts through upland passes and around lower slopes. Walking impeded with considerable buffeting. Stability challenges on exposed ridges. Feeling chilly.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No precipitation expected	Precipitation unlikely Chance of light rain at dawn, quickly fading for a dry day.
Cloud on the hills?	Little or none Possible cloud patches briefly drifting through valleys over some higher slopes in morning, mainly toward the east. Mostly dispersing.	Little cloud expected Chance of patchy fog over the high tops around dawn. Soon lifting and dissipating for cloud-free hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine and some patchy high cloud, beginning to fill in late afternoon. Visibility good, but some haze.	Intermittent sun, becoming more frequent as high cloud passes. Good visibility though some haze.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	7C. Feeling sub-zero in the wind, near -5C in exposure to stronger speeds. Above the summits. Slight frost in sheltered valleys at dawn.	9C. Feeling near freezing in strongest wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 3 April, 2025**

High pressure is centered to the northeast through the weekend, with the core of high pressure meandering near the British Isles into the next week. Extensively dry and warm with frequent sunshine. Some high cloud may come and go, becoming more frequent later in the week. Chilly mornings in valleys, slight frost and sometimes misty where sheltered, though mists will soon clear for mostly cloud-free days. East to southeasterly winds prevail, gusty in places, strongest speeds for Wales.
