

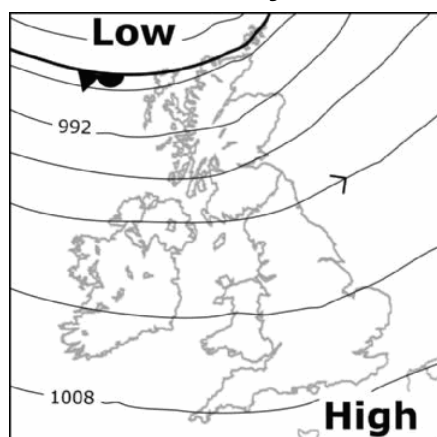
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Wednesday, 4 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 4 June, 2025

Cold: showers (very frequent west) of hail and on higher slopes snow and gale force upland winds. Southward into England and Wales, a little less cold, progressively fewer showers and decreasingly windy.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

A few showers; fairly light wind. Cloud extensive higher tops.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 4 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 20 to intermittently 25mph on higher tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Scattered showers A few showers - although from west becoming extensively dry afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly confined to higher tops Snowdon range: cloud base varying; may rise to or above 900m for a few hours, but patches at around 700m, and south from Snowdon to Llyn peninsula. cloud base may often drop to 550m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% in west, 90% in east
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine, perhaps fairly widespread eastern hills. Visibility good, but slight haze, particularly west Wales.
How Cold? (at 900m)	4C rising to 6C. Feeling below freezing point where exposed to the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 5 June	Friday 6 June
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 20 to perhaps 25mph at times Snowdon range. Fairly small.	West backing southwesterly 15 to 20mph. Will strengthen to 25 or 30mph afternoon or evening. Mostly small - although toward evening could well increasingly impede ease of walking where exposed.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain on and off; mostly clearing afternoon Pulses of rain, mostly west Wales, will ease to a few showers or perhaps clear completely afternoon.	Showery rain increasingly Showers morning mainly western hills, before rain becomes more extensive; by afternoon setting in for periods at least west Wales.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Very uncertain at this stage: Extensive in rain. In rain particularly western mountains, fog extensive above 450-650m, but near or below 300m between Snowdon and Llyn peninsula. Eastwards cloud base will rise, patches above 650m at times, but often above the summits. 20%	Clearing most, perhaps nearly all summits; but lowering again later in day Cloud base rising; by late morning most cloud above the summits, although may come and go highest tops Snowdon range. May lower toward evening to shroud higher areas, perhaps eventually below 300m Llyn peninsula north to Snowdon. 80% by midday; dropping to 20% evening
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine from time to time, although probably extensive cloud particularly west Wales. Visibility mostly very good but poor in rain.	Patches of sunshine, mainly east Wales, before high level cloud slowly thickens. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6C. Above the summits.	5C near the coast, rising to 9C well inland. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 5 June, 2025

Remaining chilly (intermittently near freezing point highest Scottish summits) for the remainder of the week - and probably most of next week. Rainfall and low cloud will remain frequent across particularly western mountains. Often windy higher summits - although mostly speeds below gale force.

Forecast issued at 15:03 on Tuesday, 3 June, 2025
