

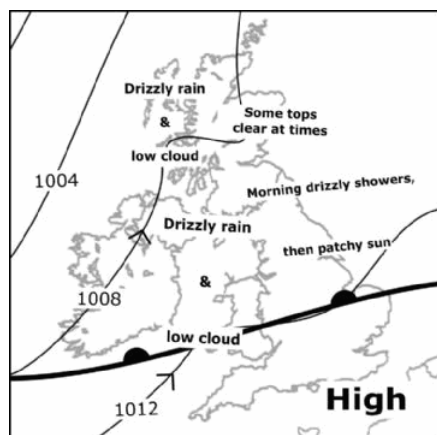

General Summary for Wednesday, 25 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 25 June, 2025

Drizzly showers and cloud drift into west Scotland, some slipping well inland. Lakeland and western Welsh mountains cloudy and drizzly as well. Clouds more broken to the east, possibly to Scottish tops after noon. Morning drizzly rain and cloud down the spine of the Pennines will clear - chance bursts of sun for a time afternoon.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Frequent cloud and drizzle on high terrain, higher cloud bases east

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 25 June, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly, shifting southwesterly, 15 to 25mph. Stronger gusts at times westernmost areas, especially later in the day.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, though at times uncomfortable walking and balance on exposed tops and ridges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzle on high terrain at times, risk wetter into evening Drizzly at times on high south and southwestern slopes. A few drizzly showers may slip northward in the early hours. Risk of patchy rain developing into the evening.
Cloud on the hills?	Most high terrain stays shrouded, best of breaks northeast hills Shrouding mountains most or all day, from mid-slopes upward western areas, or lower nearest coast. Higher cloud base toward and north of Ogwen valley, some breaks possible above 700-800m for a time afternoon. Also clearer Berwyn group.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy most of the day, best of glimpses of sun toward north/east in the afternoon. Visibility very good out of cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10C most of morning, warming slightly to 11 or 12C afternoon. Feeling close to freezing in the wind.

	Thursday 26 June	Friday 27 June
How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25-35mph. Shifting southwesterly into evening.	Southwesterly 35-40mph, some stronger wind on westernmost mountains. Generally strengthening towards 45mph into night.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking impeded in strongest winds, becoming arduous into evening. Marked wind chill.	Walking strenuous or arduous most of the day, risk of difficult conditions over tops. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Morning rain becomes patchy, fading Morning rain soon becomes patchy; may remain frequent for a few hours on western slopes. Largely fading by afternoon though a few local drizzly showers may come and go on westernmost slopes for a time.	Drizzle high tops and west slopes. Steady rain briefly at and before dawn. Drizzly, often on higher terrain and western slopes. Driest conditions around Carneddau.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive early, lifting to summits Quite extensive at dawn, down to lowest slopes in the west. Lifting and breaking through the morning to clear many summits, though caps come and go over Snowdon. Risk of more extensive cloud reforming into evening.	Extensive Extensive from mid-slopes up. Fog may drift down to low slopes southwest of Snowdon. Some higher bases and more patchy around/northeast of Ogwen valley, though high terrain remains shrouded.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Becoming 90%	Less than 10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Morning clouds break somewhat for patchy sunshine. Excellent visibility.	Only glimpses of sun eastern mid-Wales, if any. Good visibility below cloud, though some haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 or 8C. Warmer at daybreak, locally 10C. Feeling at or below freezing in wind.	10C at daybreak, rising to 13C, locally warmer near Carneddau.
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 26 June, 2025

West to southwesterly winds prevail through this week and into the weekend facilitating a series of Atlantic frontal systems. Rain and drizzle most frequent in west with low cloud often covering hills, typically most extensive in northwest England and Scotland. Higher cloud bases and drier further eastwards. Temperatures near average, or lower at times in Scotland; Wales may see periods of above average temperatures. Windy into the weekend with risk of more extensive upland gales and heavier rain at times. Some indication of high pressure inching towards the British Isles later weekend and early the following week may allow for sunnier conditions at times with gentler winds.
