

General Summary for Friday, 4 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 4 July, 2025

Gales and rain setting in across Scotland. Rain will be persistent and heavy in the west - beware risk of local flooding. Clear fells for a time in England, rain and cloud setting in later afternoon. The Pennines from Yorkshire Dales southward mostly dry and free of cloud. A fair but windy day in Wales, rain only arriving later in north Wales.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Wind increasing to gale force; substantially dry

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 4 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 30 to 40mph. Speeds increase through afternoon reaching 50mph+ over the tops into evening.	
Effect of wind on you?	Arduous walking conditions over the hills, may become difficult on high tops. Considerable wind chill.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Dry most of the day, rain sets in as night falls Most of daytime dry. Rain setting in from the west as evening approaches, becoming persistent for a time as night falls - likely heavy falls on western slopes.	
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting above tops much of day Cloud caps over higher slopes in the morning will soon lift to expose many tops. Odd banks may return to western high slopes at times, becoming more frequent into the evening. Cloud then filling in more extensively into the night.	
Chance of cloud free summits?	70%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, glimpses of sun in east; cloud thickening from west with time. Visibility good, later reducing in rain.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	9 or 10C, small rise during day. Feeling near/below freezing in the wind.

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly to southwesterly 25 to 35mph.	West to northwesterly 25-30mph. Increasing into evening, risk up to 40mph over high tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Very blustery over the mountains, frequent buffeting on high tops, challenging balance where exposed; feeling cool.	Comfortability of walking affected most of the day, becoming strenuous with buffeting gusts into evening. Feeling cool.
How wet?	Frequent showery rain	Showers, at times persistent
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain on and off much of the day, drizzly for a time on western slopes.	Showers most of the day, most frequent on northwest slopes facing Anglesey; may be drizzly here at times. May become fairly persistent rain for a few hours with heavy bursts.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, base rising	Fairly extensive, some improvement
	Shrouding the mountains widely in morning above 400-600m, lifting gradually mostly above 700-800m, but persisting on tops. Occasional breaks to higher terrain around Carneddau.	Extensive over high terrain much of the day. North and west slopes nearest Anglesey regularly shrouded to middle slopes. Becoming patchy later afternoon, tops southeast of Glyder Fawr/Snowdon increasingly clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%	20%, becoming 70% southeast
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, brief moments of sun around Carneddau. Visibility at times very good, but poor during rain.	Greatest chance of glimpses southeast of high tops, improving later. Visibility often poor, good where cloud breaks.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10 or 11C, locally reaching 12C around Ogwen valley. Feeling near/below freezing directly in the wind.	7 or 8C Feeling at/near freezing in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 5 July, 2025

The weekend ahead will be generally unsettled: windy and feeling cool with low pressure bringing heavy showery rain widely. High pressure to the southwest will extend to the Isles early next week, settling the weather and allowing sun to break through Monday and Tuesday. Into the week, a mixed westerly regime dominates with greatest risk of rain toward northwest Scotland, drier and warmer further south and east. Several fronts will drift towards Britain from the northwest but high pressure to the southwest will prevent extended unsettled periods. England and Wales may only see occasional rain.
