

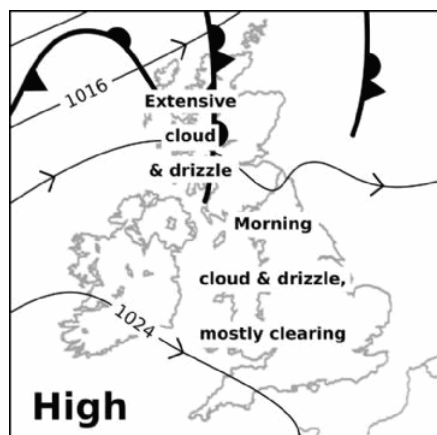

General Summary for Wednesday, 9 July, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 9 July, 2025

Extensive cloud and drizzle near the all western coasts; improving in the afternoon when only a few patches remain, most extensive on the Cuillin where it will also be windy. Cloud base higher well inland with occasional breaks; clearing Peak District and parts of Wales. Feeling cool in Scotland and mild in England and Wales.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Morning cloud improving. Light winds.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 9 July, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 10 to 20mph, perhaps often lower speeds with variable direction wind.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Possible early drizzle Patchy drizzle or light rain early in the day, fading out.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fairly extensive, but improving Shrouding many hills in morning, to 400-500m or lower for a time near coasts, mostly above 600m further inland. Gradually thinning during the middle of the day, some patches may remain near coast and in Eryri/Snowdonia NP. 20% rising to 70% afternoon.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy morning, occasional sun breaking through, more widely later. Misty coastal hills in morning; visibility becoming good below cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	12C rising to 15C, humid. Feeling a touch cooler in the wind. Above the summits

	Thursday 10 July	Friday 11 July
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly or variable 10mph or less.	Light winds with variable direction. Risk southerly 15mph near Cardigan Bay.
Effect of wind on you?	Negligible.	Negligible, small near the west coast.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	Very likely dry Remote risk of isolated late-afternoon thundery showers. Dry otherwise.
Cloud on the hills?	Hills soon clear Patchy mist or low cloud around hill slopes soon dispersing; high tops likely above early mist. Sea fog may locally linger in far west near Llyn peninsula.	Little or no cloud Very small chance of patchy cloud on higher ground should there be afternoon showers.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly sunny. Visibility very good.	Widespread sunshine; beware sunburn and dehydration. Excellent visibility near west coast; some haze eastern Cymru/Wales.
How Cold? (at 900m)	13C rising to 16C.	17 to 19C, warmest in the Berwyn Mountains where it may reach 22C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 10 July, 2025

A humid southwesterly wind midweek produces extensive low cloud across west and northwest Scotland with some drizzly rain. Drier with sun and broken cloud in eastern Scotland, improving in southern areas. High pressure expanding over England and Wales brings more sunshine and draws in increasingly very warm air again in the later part of this week; higher temperatures and more sunshine extending into Scotland with time. A fine and very warm weekend in prospect, low risk of thundery showers forming toward the west. Cooler with a greater risk of showers early next week.
