

General Summary for Monday, 8 September, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 8 September, 2025

Strong winds and scattered showers western Scotland; clearer east with only patchy upland cloud. Showers in England, risk more concentrated rain over Lakeland and west Pennines for periods with heavy bursts. Little cloud on Pennines. Blustery in Wales with frequent showers, risk local hail/thunder.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Blustery over tops; frequent showers, risk heavy bursts

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 8 September, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25 to 30mph, up to 35mph or gusting higher over high tops in Yr Wyddfa/Snowdon group.	
Effect of wind on you?	Comfort of walking affected - balance may require bracing in strongest gusts over high tops and exposed ridges. Feeling chilly.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showery rain, frequent and heavy at times Showery rain comes and goes throughout the day. Tending to merge into broader areas of rain at times, particularly afternoon and western slopes near Cardigan Bay. Risk of heavy bursts with hail and isolated thunder.	
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive over western tops; tending to improve north and east Often covering the hills above 700-900m, at times below 600m in west coastal areas. Bases will vary as showers come and go, though generally lifting with highest bases	
Chance of cloud free summits?	north of Ogwen valley, some clear tops north and east of Glyder Fawr. 20% tops near Cardigan Bay. Rising to 50% elsewhere	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bursts of sunshine between showers - possibly only glimpses on western slopes. Variable visibility as showers come and go; some haze early.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 or 8C. Warming slightly mid-Wales east of high tops. Feeling at/near freezing directly in the wind.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly 20-25mph in the morning. Rising towards 30-35mph, shifting somewhat southeasterly; may rise further Comfortable walking becoming affected, increasingly strenuous. Stability will become challenged on exposed tops.	Southerly 30-40mph, stronger gusts over high tops. Easing to 25-35mph through afternoon and shifting southwesterly. Walking strenuous on high terrain - attention to balance needed in exposure. Considerable wind chill.
How wet?	Little rain expected	Showery rain, more frequent afternoon
(Precipitation and its impact)	Spots of drizzly rain may affect slopes near the Llyn Peninsula in the morning. Small risk of isolated showery rain from the west late in the day.	Showery rain on-and-off most of the day. Showers tending to merge into broader areas of rain with heavy bursts for several hours afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Likely clearing summits for several hours	Extensive, some variability
	From dawn, local fog patches in sheltered valleys with variable banks upslope, high tops likely shrouded. Cloud lifts and breaks to clear many summits, risk of returning across most high terrain late in the day.	Extensive over high terrain from dawn with banks down to lower slopes south and west of Snowdon. Higher bases around Glyder Fawr towards Carneddau. Bases will vary in and out of rain, at times extensive down to middle slopes.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90% for much of the day	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often sunny well into the morning. High and fair weather cloud building afternoon. Very good visibility.	Sunshine unlikely. Mostly poor visibility in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8 to 10C.	8 or 9C. Feeling near freezing in strongest wind.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 9 September, 2025

Low pressure over the north Atlantic dominates the weather pattern over the next 10 days, maintaining unsettled conditions. West to southwesterly winds prevail bringing frequent rain and cloud to western areas, regularly becoming more widespread as weather features come and go. Early indications suggest a deeper area of low pressure late weekend and early next week will bring widespread gales, possibly severe on highest terrain.

Tending to improve after mid-month with longer periods of dry weather, but a persistent southwesterly regime will continue to draw unsettled spells of weather into Britain, notably in the north.
