

General Summary for Wednesday, 22 October, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 22 October, 2025

Chilly west to southwest winds, strong for a time north Highlands, with showers across western hills, but few if any reaching eastern areas. Cloud bases lifting to higher slopes, but persisting across western tops, whilst eastern hills seeing good clearances with the best of the sunshine, albeit weak due to high cloud.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Mostly dry, bar the odd shower, and a moderate breeze.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 22 October, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	West turning southwesterly 15 to 20mph. Uncertain into night, variable then easterly, may start to increase.	
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small during daytime. Possible deterioration into night.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Odd showers One or two brief light showers, mostly west coastal areas. Into night, possibility of some rain developing, may well mostly remain further south, leaving just areas of showers.	
Cloud on the hills?	Patches western tops, clearing Some patchy cloud on higher western slopes, mostly above 700m, tending to disperse. Eastern hills largely clear. If rain arrives later, cloud then lowering.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 23 October, 2025

A complex weather situation around midweek with various centres of low pressure drifting around slowly. Areas of rain and showers, but also drier moments - possibly Thursday often dry in eastern Scotland and northern England - beware of a deterioration from the northwest during Thursday with gales and rain setting in . Significantly colder later in the week as winds turn northerly. Freezing level dropping to 800-1000m into the weekend, lowest in northern Scotland. A mix of sunshine and showers falling as snow on high terrain, most frequent in north-facing areas. Falling week, less cold, but frequent rain in the west.
