

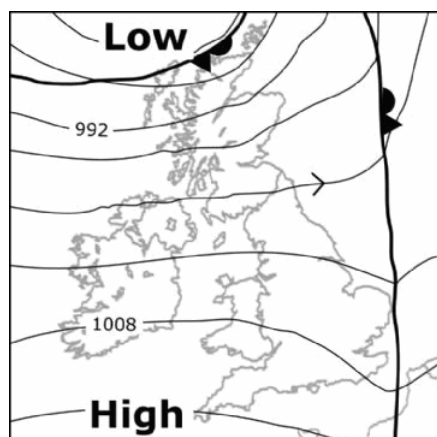

General Summary for Sunday, 2 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 2 November, 2025

Showery westerly winds, reaching gale force Scottish Highlands where cold enough for snow on higher tops. The rain will be almost constant NW Highlands, whilst from southern Scotland southward, showers will become well scattered. Least windy south Wales.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Blustery higher slopes. Showers. Cold.

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 2 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25 to 30mph, strongest higher tops Snowdon range.
Effect of wind on you?	Where exposed, marked wind chill and walking will be impeded, particularly higher tops Snowdon range.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional showers Showers from time to time, fairly brief.
Cloud on the hills?	Frequently covering higher tops Cloud widely covering the hills after dawn. Cloud base will rise through morning to around 800m, but temporarily lower near showers
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine by late morning particularly east Wales. Good visibility, but slight haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	3C. Will feel as cold as minus 8C directly in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Monday 3 November	Tuesday 4 November
How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 45-50mph.	South to higher up southwesterly 40 to 50mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult walking and significant wind chill where exposed on higher tops.	Continued difficult conditions where exposed on higher areas, where wind chill will be significant and walking a struggle.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Persistent rain Rain and drizzle most of the day, most heavy and persistent western mountains. Very wet underfoot with local flood risk. Progressively less wet north across Carneddau and east toward Berwyn mountains.	Frequent or persistent rain. Rain most or all day. Breaks in the rain most likely east Wales. On western mountains, very wet underfoot and streams in spate with possible flooding.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive Widely shrouding the mountains from 200 or 300m up, although progressively north of the A5 and east toward the Berwyn mountains, the cloud base rising to around 650m.	Very extensive. Widely persistent fog above 200 to 400m. Near and north from the A5 and toward Berwyn mountains, higher cloud base, may reach 750m.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Almost nil	10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensively dull and misty with visibility poor in heavier rain.	Little if any sun: mostly dull and misty.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C. Feeling below freezing in direct wind.	8C Will feel as cold as minus 5C directly in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 3 November, 2025

A series of deep Atlantic lows and associated fronts will continue to cross Britain over the next week to ten days. Frequently windy, and high rainfall, particularly on western mountains (rain at some stage almost daily) and cloud will frequently cover higher areas. Only rarely cold enough for snow higher mountains in Scotland.
