

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# General Summary for Thursday, 6 November, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 6 November, 2025

Mild and damp southerly air - lowest cloud on south-facing hills. Morning rain and drizzle in the Highlands easing off, some rise of cloud base. Gusty in places, strongest wind western Scotland. England sees little more than patchy rain or drizzle, whilst Wales has some pulses of heavier rain moving up from the south.

#### Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Varied cloud, local bursts of rain forming. Moderate breeze.

### Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 6 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 15 to 25mph, occasional 30mph, gusty around rain locally.		
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but some gustier moments starting to affect comfortable walking on exposed terrain.		
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Local bursts of rain develop  Largely dry start apart from local drizzle. Pulses of rain moving up from the south, some heavier bursts, greatest risk toward west coast, then more widely in afternoon, but hit and miss locally. Chance of very localised hail and thunder.  Wet underfoot, streams remaining fast-flowing, some flooding.		
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, lowest bases in the west.		
	Extensive hill fog likely. Lowest and most widespread cloud on fells nearest the west coast. Local breaks inland, perhaps more substantial for a time north of A5.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	10% near west coast, 40% north of A5.		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly overcast.		
	Visibility rather hazy and becoming widely poor in rain and drizzle.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	9 or 10C, fairly humid.		
Freezing Level	Above the summits

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 20-30mph. Trending higher later afternoon, reaching up to 40mph for several hours.	South trending southwesterly, 20 to 30mph, speed may vary during day, at times gusty 35mph around higher tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small at times, then walking becoming impeded, strenuous-to-arduous conditions by dusk.	Starting to affect comfortable walking and balance in places on exposed higher terrain. Marked wind chill.
How wet?	Spots of patchy rain	Drizzle or local showery rain
(Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy drizzly rain comes and goes on southern slopes, particularly towards the Lleyn peninsula. Around dusk, patches will merge into a broader area of rain.	Drizzly rain on and off, some showery rain occasionally on hills toward Cardigan Bay.  More often dry toward Carneddau.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly high tops and southern slopes	Fairly extensive, local breaks north
	Cloud fairly extensive over the high summits most of the day. Banks of cloud forming down on medium southern slopes, higher bases to the north. Higher breaks will occur, best of clear tops around Carneddau.	Varied cloud banks in the morning, some patchy mist lower down, fairly extensive above 600m, rising a little with time away from rain. Mostly above 800m north of the A5, here some breaks forming at times.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	20%, to 40% Carneddau
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Glimpses of sunshine, best on northern slopes with some extended periods. Excellent visibility.	Largely cloudy, glimpses of sun mostly Ogwen valley northward. Varied mist in morning, and reduced in rain, locally good below cloud in north.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 or 8C. May be up to 9C on northern slopes at dawn.	5 or 6C. Feeling below freezing if exposed to stronger sustained wind on high tops.

## **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 7 November, 2025

Staying mild with low cloud, drizzle and rain at times through into next week. Areas northeast of major hill groups seeing least rain and highest cloud breaks. Southerly winds of varied strengths, sometimes more blustery, approaching gale-force in exposed western areas. Some drier areas into the weekend, then a risk of heavier rain returning from the west, soonest into Wales and southwest Scotland on Sunday.

Further into next week, easterly winds are likely to develop for Scotland, bringing drier weather to the west, and potentially much colder with time. England & Wales may remain frequently wet under slow-moving low pressure.
