

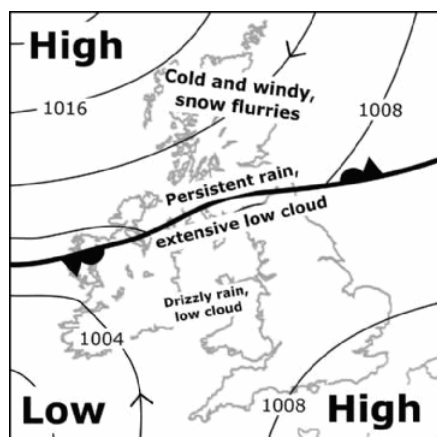

General Summary for Thursday, 13 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 13 November, 2025

Cold northeasterlies for the Highlands, gale-force over mountains early in day. Snow mostly in northern areas. A slow-moving swathe of rain for southern Scotland and northern England, heavy at times. Previous rain eases to patchy light rain in Wales, but beware of flooding - staying mild here.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Patchy rain, low cloud. Wind easing.

Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 13 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	Southwesterly 25-35mph, lessening afternoon, a marked lull from dusk, but will strengthen E'ly 30-50mph into night.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking strenuous in exposure in morning, conditions tend to ease through afternoon. Beware deteriorating again into night.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showery rain, may ease; flooding Very wet ground and flooding following heavy rain Wednesday and overnight. Periods of showery rain through morning, these tending ease as the day goes though a risk of returning for periods, most likely on northern slopes.
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly high tops and west slopes Fog will cling to higher summits and down to the middle slopes facing Cardigan Bay likely all day. Banks with higher bases will drift towards Carneddau and east Wales, at times clearer here.
Chance of cloud free summits?	10%; 40% east Wales
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, glimpses of sun east. Visibility very good, though locally poor in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7C; tending to lower to 4C into evening. Feeling near or below freezing in wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Friday 14 November	Saturday 15 November
How windy? (On the summits)	Easterly, 45 to 60mph, later 70mph, ferocious gusts including passes and in places downslope to west of high terrain.	Easterly 50-60mph from dawn, powerful gusts downslope to west. Tending to gradually decrease, some uncertainty.
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult conditions across the mountains, gusts likely to knock you over, not just on highest terrain. Significant wind chill.	Widely difficult, turbulent gusts on some slopes may continue all day. Some improvement possible with time.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Prolonged rain setting in, flooding A slow-moving extensive belt of rain, heaviest sustained falls over eastern hills. Patchier northwestern areas in morning. Turning to sleet or wet snow higher tops. Saturated ground, expect flooding, becoming significant later.	Rain fading out, flooding Continuing rain from overnight through dawn, but intensity easing and gradually becoming patchier during the day, leaving occasional mostly light rain afternoon. Considerable flooding expected.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, lowest east Likely to cover the hills widely, lowest bases 400-500m eastern areas, mostly 600m further west, some local higher breaks toward west coast.	Extensive, rising with some breaks Covering the hills widely, lowest bases in eastern areas around 500-600m, mostly lifting above 800m in west. May tend to lift and break gradually, best in west.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and dull. Visibility poor due to rain.	Overcast, some brighter skies may develop toward west coast. Hazy, visibility improving as rain eases.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	2 or 3C, dropping to 1C later (small change with height above 700m). Wind chill feeling like -10 to -15C. Dropping close to freezing point over higher slopes as the day progresses.	1 or 2C (little change with height above 700m). Wind chill feeling like -15C in exposure. Just above freezing on upper slopes.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 14 November, 2025

High rainfall with significant flooding expected for Wales by the end of this week, risk flooding too in Peak District. Drier overall across the Highlands. Strong to gale force easterlies later this week, then northerlies are expected to dominate onward into next week. Colder air extends to all areas, staying below freezing over higher mountains most likely throughout next week to 10 days. Some accumulations of snow over Scottish mountains, initially mostly northern areas, possibly more widely across all mountain areas during next week - Tuesday-Wednesday in particular, but lower confidence of forecast detail by then.
