

# General Summary for Friday, 21 November, 2025



## British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 21 November, 2025

Terrain widely frozen after hard frost; snow cover across much upland terrain, or more substantial to lower slopes northern Highlands. A front moves into Scotland, snow then rain in west, cloud lowering. Elsewhere dry, sunshine weakening. Wind strengthening to gale force Scottish mountains.

#### Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Mostly light wind during day. Dry with sunshine, high cloud.

### Detailed Forecast for Friday, 21 November, 2025

How windy? (On the summits)	North-northwest turning west later southwesterly, 15 to 20mph at first, soon dropping to 10mph or less for a few hours, increasing afternoon to 20mph up to dusk, into night eventually to 40-50mph.		
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small during daytime, then feeling more blustery up to dusk, deteriorating into the night.		
How wet?	Generally dry until midnight		
(Precipitation and its	A covering of snow over snow mountains, mostly north & east hills.		
impact)	Chance an odd early flurry near coast, but most or all daytime dry.		
	Into night, rain developing from west, snow on higher terrain for a time.		
Cloud on the hills?	Little if any		
	Hills largely clear all day.		
	Into afternoon, some patches may form on slopes near west coast.		
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun through high cloud, tending to thicken from west, may become obscured later. Visibility excellent, possible mist or haze in some valleys.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C, slight rise toward 0C afternoon, then just above into night.  If wind increases, feeling near -10C later.		
Freezing Level	Terrain widely frozen inland in morning, all day out of sunlight. Near coast up to 700m, then into night widely just above freezing to upper slopes.

How windy? (On the summits)  Effect of wind on you?	SW'ly 40mph at first, risk 50mph prior to dawn, easing to W later SW'ly again, 20-25mph. Into night S'ly 40-50mph.  Challenging conditions around and before dawn, improving, but still noticeably breezy with marked wind chill on high tops.	Low confidence of detail: Likely west or northwesterly, speed may vary, but risk up to 50mph, chance 60mph.  Beware possibility of generally poor conditions, difficult walking and significant wind chill.
How wet?	Early rain fades, light showers	Frequent rain, heavy bursts
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain from overnight through to dawn, clearing into morning. Tending to ease off and become patchy, drier afternoon. Rain returning persistently into night.	Rain frequent or merging to more persistent falls over western hills, heavy bursts on and off. May fall as snow occasionally on highest tops, risk hail.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive, some rising into afternoon	Extensive
	Shrouding the hills widely, banks to some lower elevations in morning. Base tending to rise to 600-800m, lowest near coast, higher breaks Carneddau to Berwyn and Bala groups afternoon.	Cloud base may vary, but often covering hills above 600-800m, lowest near to west coast, some breaks well inland/eastward.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, brief glimpses of sun north of the A5. Misty and dull, some improvement if rain fades.	No sun expected. Visibility often poor in precipitation, local improvements eastern hills.
How Cold? (at 900m)	2 or 3C. Feeling like -5C in the wind, nearer -10C perhaps just at first.	0 to 2C. Feeling like -10 to -15C if exposed to stronger speeds.
Freezing Level	Above the summits, but some highest terrain may stay at least partly frozen.	Above the summits; may drop to 900-1000m in heavier precipitation, then more generally 900m into night.

## **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 22 November, 2025

Changes into the weekend as less cold Atlantic air moves in, but higher mountain terrain at least in Scotland staying frozen with snow cover. A complex area of low pressure circulates over Britain through the weekend, retreating to leave briefly northeasterly winds by Monday; areas of rain and some upland snow, mainly Scotland and high tops in northern England. Winds will vary markedly, some lulls, but risk periods of gales. A brief ridge of high pressure gives a lull by Tuesday, then a shift to milder southwesterlies is likely to bring spells of rain and some thawing to higher levels.
