

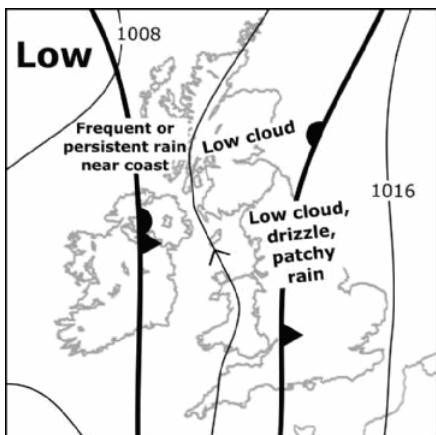

General Summary for Monday, 19 January, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 19 January, 2026

Rain near the west coast of Scotland, largely dry inland, but low cloud covering southern Highlands widely, higher and more broken cloud northward. Rain or drizzle and blanket fog over the Pennines, drier for Lakes and Wales, with best cloud breaks northern areas. Southerly winds strongest N/W Scotland, gusty.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Increasing gusty wind. Patchy cloud, clearer NW, mostly dry.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 19 January, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 20mph, gusty 25mph in places around some higher tops, increasing during afternoon to 30mph, stronger gusts soon after dark in west.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but becoming more blustery in exposure, affecting ease of walking. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A little drizzle locally Occasional drizzly rain around low cloud, amounts small. Northern areas more often dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Low cloud south/east, clearer northwest Low cloud from mid-slopes upward in mid Wales. Higher bases and more broken cloud northwestward, breaks toward some tops Carneddau and northwest Snowdon group.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% Bala to mid-Wales, 60% N/W areas.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and dull, poor visibility mid and east Wales, hazy lower down, locally much better toward northwest with some sun and very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	3C. Feeling like -5 to -8C directly in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above freezing to higher tops, but high terrain stays partly frozen.

	Tuesday 20 January	Wednesday 21 January
How windy? (On the summits)	South-southeasterly, strengthening 40 to 50mph, risk 60mph, powerful gusts high tops and in places downslope to north.	Southeasterly 30 to 50mph, speed likely to vary during the day, but risk generally strengthening with time.
Effect of wind on you?	Arduous or increasingly difficult walking conditions, gusts could knock you over, not just on the tops; significant wind chill.	Walking increasingly arduous over exposed terrain, gusts frequently knocking you off balance. Significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A little rain Occasional light rain and drizzle, small amounts toward the north. Later in day, risk some steadier rain setting in, after dark likely heavier.	Patchy rain, snow tops; risk frequent Rain on and off, may be fairly persistent for periods, sleet or snow falling on higher tops; smaller amounts northern areas.
Cloud on the hills?	Covering many tops, breaks north Often covering most higher terrain, varying during the day, best of breaks higher up toward north of Ogwen.	Fairly extensive Covering most higher hills, from 500 to 700m upward, higher cloud bases toward the north, some breaks Carneddau.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Generally cloudy, some brighter moments and glimpses of sun north where visibility good below cloud, reduced around rain.	Overcast and dull, poor visibility in rain, locally better at times north.
How Cold? (at 900m)	1 or 2C. Wind chill feeling like -12 to -15C.	Around 0C. Wind chill feeling like -10 to -15C where exposed on higher areas.
Freezing Level	Just above freezing on highest summits, icy surfaces on high tops.	Near or just below freezing above 800m, tending to lower slightly during day.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 20 January, 2026**

South to southeasterly winds prevail during the week ahead, widely strengthening to become persistently windy, gales over mountains with powerful gusts. Mountains near to freezing point in Scotland, typically just above freezing to high tops in England and Wales for a few days. A slowly circulating weather system will bring areas of rain and high-level snow, becoming more persistent as the week progresses, cloud covering most hills; generally driest and clearest in northwest Scotland. Colder air trying to move in from the east into later January, leaving most mountain terrain frozen in the longer range.
