

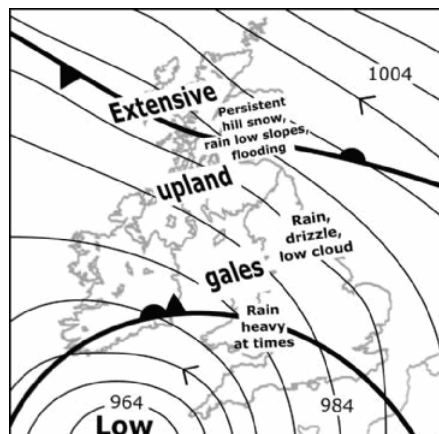
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Friday, 23 January, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 23 January, 2026

Gales widespread across all mountain areas, powerful turbulent gusts downslope toward the west in places. Prolonged upland snow southeastern Highlands into southern Cairngorms, increasingly rain to mid-heights. Further rain also spreads north across Wales then the Pennines. Low cloud widely.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Gales on tops. Rain develops, low cloud.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 23 January, 2026

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	East-southeasterly strengthening from before dawn to 45-55mph early morning, 60mph for a few hours; stronger gusts in places around tops, high passes and downslope west of summits. Arduous walking with considerable buffeting, more challenging mobility in places. Significant wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain/sleet becoming fairly persistent, less northwest. A little rain on and off in morning, amounts mostly small or largely dry in northwest at first, but increasingly frequent rain into middle of day, falling as sleet or snow above 800m for a time, then wetter. Patchy rain and showers into afternoon, rain most frequent eastern mid-Wales.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Extensive over tops and east slopes Often capping higher slopes, most persistent mid-Wales to middle slopes but bases varying, lowering in rain. Highest bases northwest Snowdon group, clearing above tops occasionally and western slopes often clear. 30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, often dull on high tops and east slopes. Visibility good away from cloud and precipitation but some haze likely.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	0 or 1C, slight rise to 2C afternoon. Wind chill feels as cold as -15C. 900-1000m in morning, lifting just above freezing to high tops into afternoon, then dropping slightly again after dark.

How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 45 to 60mph, powerful gusts in passes and downslope to NW; top speed may fluctuate during day.	Southeasterly, speed may vary, in range 20 to 35mph, locally stronger gusts around high tops and downslope to NW.
Effect of wind on you?	Challenging conditions; walking and balance difficult in exposed areas, buffeting gusts lower down; significant wind chill.	Blustery over most high terrain, in places more frequent buffeting not just on the tops. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Intermittent rain, snow tops Rain on and off, most frequent eastern hills, falling as sleet or snow on higher tops, mostly above 700m. Patchier small amounts westward.	Patchy rain Occasional rain, most frequent or persistent over eastern Wales, patchier westwards.
Cloud on the hills?	Lowest east, some breaks west Covering many higher tops all day, lowest bases around Bala group, around 500-600m. Breaks toward some upper slopes nearer to western coasts.	Fairly extensive Covering many high tops all day, lowest and most persistent cloud east and mid-Wales. Higher cloud and some breaks further northwestward.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, locally brighter west, where visibility good if dry. Poor visibility in rain, or very poor if in snow on high tops.	Largely cloudy, hazy. Poor visibility over many hills, brighter and locally good visibility toward northwest.
How Cold? (at 900m)	0C. Directly in the wind feeling like -15C.	1C. Feeling like -8 to -12C in the wind.
Freezing Level	Around 800m, but some western high slopes may be just above freezing point.	Close to freezing on higher summits around 1000m.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 24 January, 2026

East to southeasterlies continue through the weekend and onward into next week, frequently strong to gale-force over the mountains, giving severe chill factor. Below freezing across high terrain in Scotland, and into early next week a lowering freezing level over hills in England and Wales. Frequent or persistent snowfall over east and southern Scottish mountains, rain on lower slopes causing flooding in the short term. Patchier and small amounts reaching coastal regions in west-northwest Scotland. Areas of rain and increasingly hill snow push across England and Wales as low pressure remains dominant. Low cloud often covering many hills.

Forecast issued at 16:01 on Thursday, 22 January, 2026
