



## General Summary for Saturday, 7 February, 2026



### British Mountain Summary:

#### Based on forecast chart for noon 7 February, 2026

Continuing with the east to south-easterly airflow with hills shrouded in extensive low cloud with widely murky conditions. Patchy snow across the Highlands tending to ease, best breaks again toward the northwestern coasts of Scotland.

Showery rain extending north through Wales into northern England.

## Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 7 February, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South-easterly 15 to 25mph, but perhaps lifting to 30mph east Wales and into mid Wales.
Effect of wind on you?	<b>Increasingly blustery across hills in east Wales down to mid Wales. Otherwise, mostly small.</b>
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Showery</b> Showers, particularly W Wales - risk that the rain may be almost constant for an hour or two.
Cloud on the hills?	<b>Extensive, lowest east Wales.</b> Extensive low cloud across the hills, widely to mid slopes across east Wales, but more generally around 800-1000m toward the west coast.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Very little if any sun. General haze, best visibility near west coast.
How Cold? (at 900m)	1C, lifting to plus 3C
Freezing Level	1000m, but soon above highest summits.

## Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	<b>Sunday 8 February</b>	<b>Monday 9 February</b>
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Southerly typically 15 to 20mph possibly 25mph at times.	South-easterly 20 to 30mph, perhaps 35-40mph at times western coastal hills.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Mostly small</b>	<b>Blustery and gusty for periods, especially western coastal hills, where perhaps fairly arduous. Considerable wind chill.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Showers</b> Rain now and again, particularly afternoon falling as heavy showers. Risk hail.	<b>Patches or spots of rain here and there</b> Within an overcast environment, here and there patches, or occasional spots, of rain, particularly southern and eastern areas.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Extensive on higher slopes.</b>  Cloud base typically 600 to 800m, rare breaks to higher tops, but nearer 300m in rain.	<b>Extensive, best breaks west coast.</b>  Extensive low cloud covering the hills. Widely mid to lower slopes east Wales. Higher bases Snowdon and west coast, where mostly confined above 800m.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>Less than 10%</b>	<b>20%, but 50% toward west coast.</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine; visibility very good, but poor in rain.	Overcast.  General haze, extensive areas of mist and murk.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>	2C	2C
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits.	Above the summits

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 8 February, 2026**

Overall little change in conditions over the coming week: the mountains extensively foggy, precipitation from time to time (again concentrated on eastern Scotland and southern and eastern Wales) and often strong southeast or easterly wind. However, a slight rise in temperature will result in thawing of lying snow from southern Scotland southwards and some thawing up to around 900, sometimes 1050m Scottish Highlands - although the return of low freezing level toward the middle of next week.
