



General Summary for Saturday, 7 March, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 7 March, 2026

Another dry and mostly sunny day across the Scottish mountains, but patchy cloud capping some western tops at times; strong southerly wind for northwest Highlands, gale force gusts Skye. England and Wales: Sunny for Lakes and N Pennines, but low cloud much of Wales, and capping Peak District, a little light rain.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Mostly cloudy, with extensive banks of hill fog higher terrain. Risk of light patchy rain.

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 7 March, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Southerly 10 to 20mph, local gusty spots around higher western mountains.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Risk of a little light rain edging in Legacy of old front, may give some patches of light rain. Mostly near west coast at first, but may edge inland.
Cloud on the hills?	Banks covering hills. The legacy of an old front will leave fairly extensive banks of cloud across the hills, down to mid slopes across some hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Extensive cloud cover, patchy glimpses of sun, may be more widespread west coast. Visibility good or very good, but still hazy lower down.
How Cold? (at 900m)	1C lifting to 4C.
Freezing Level	Patchy slight frost in valleys at dawn, otherwise above freezing to tops.

Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small	Mostly small
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Risk of a little rain Risk of a little rain, mainly toward western mountains.	Patchy light rain Patches of light rain and drizzle tending to extend in from the west. Small amounts.
Cloud on the hills?	Will cover western tops Uncertain detail, but cloud banks may cover higher terrain, mostly toward west coast.	Covering hills increasingly Hills will likely increasingly be covered in low cloud, as patchy rain develops from the west.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30% west coast, 70% elsewhere.	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Broken cloud, giving a little patchy sun here and there. Dense haze.	Any early patchy sun, tending to give way to dull, overcast skies. Slight haze, and poor visibility in any patchy light rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	4C	4C
Freezing Level	Above the summits, but slight frost some inland valleys at dawn.	Above the summits

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 8 March, 2026**

More cloud by Sunday as weak fronts encroach in from the west, some drizzly rain moving into mainly western parts, hazy elsewhere; dense across southern areas. Patchy rain likely in the west at least early in the new week, likely dropping back just below freezing on the Munros for a time with some snowfall on higher areas. Winds fairly light early week, then a risk of strengthening southwesterly later in the week; changeable weather conditions with spells of rain coming in from the Atlantic. Remaining old snow cover on Scottish mountains stays largely consolidated with little change, only very patchy snow remains around highest tops in England and Wales.
