

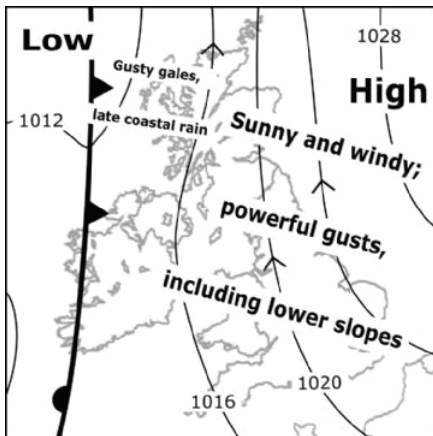

General Summary for Tuesday, 7 April, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 7 April, 2026

Patchy mist in some sheltered valleys at dawn, soon dissipating for sunshine and cloud-free hills, locally hazy. Mild temperatures, including to summits, particularly Wales where summits may be several degrees warmer than mid-slopes. High cloud builds, thickest north and west, some rain northwest Scotland later.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Windy, gale-force gusts; sunny and warm, including summits

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 7 April, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South-southeasterly 30 to 40mph, strong gusts likely over tops and passes, as well as lower slopes to the northwest, reaching up to 50mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Walking impeded all day, buffeting gusts often make walking arduous with balance challenges, with sudden strong gusts likely to low northwestern slopes as well.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain not expected
Cloud on the hills?	Hills clear Patchy mist some valleys at first, this soon dissipating for clear hills.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bright sunshine, thin high cloud slowly building, thickening and later may mostly shroud the sun. Visibility good, but some haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	12 to 14C, possibly warmer even on the high tops due to an inversion; much cooler temperatures in the valleys at dawn.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Wednesday 8 April	Thursday 9 April
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 10 to 15mph, later strengthening, 25mph gusts over tops. Fairly small, but becoming blustery in exposure later in the day.	Northwesterly 30-35mph, though westerly early in the day. Sudden strong gusts probable much of the day. Strenuous walking in exposure most of the day with notable wind chill. Sudden strong gusts challenging balance at times.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely Most likely dry. Small chance of an isolated shower, mainly later in daytime.	Several hours of rain, some showers later Patchy rain at dawn, soon setting in for several hours. Breaking afternoon, perhaps a dry spell, but then followed by showers, falling as snow above 700m.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Patchy cloud, mostly little Mist in some valleys from dawn, possible patches of cloud around some hill slopes, largely dispersing. Some cloud banks may linger on west coastal hills. 70%	Mostly high and western terrain, increasingly clear Fairly extensive over high terrain in the morning, lowest bases in the west, to 500m during rain. Lifting and breaking afternoon, mostly above 800-900m, clear summits for periods, and trending towards clearer conditions into evening. Rising to 40%, 60% by evening
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often sunny but some high cloud around. Visibility good, some haze.	Mostly cloud early with poor visibility in rain. Sunshine breaking out afternoon with very good visibility, best in the east.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	10 to 12C, several degrees cooler in the valleys at first. Above the summits.	3C or milder from dawn, cooling to 0C. Feeling like -10C in direct wind. Above the summits at dawn, lowering to the summits with time, reaching 800-900m around evening.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 8 April, 2026

Variable temperature in the near term: warm on Wednesday for England & Wales at least, becoming cooler over western Scotland as a cold front sweeps eastward; more widely cooler Thursday with freezing temperatures on high terrain and snow showers; milder by Friday with some sun in England and Wales, settling on near-average temperatures over the weekend. A changeable mix of weather during this period with some rain and showers with snow or hail on the hills, and often windy late week into the weekend in Scotland. More settled England and Wales but a few windy, wet spells will affect these areas too. Into the following week, first indications of high pressure building, winds shifted easterly bringing some rain to eastern areas but often sunny with lighter wind and near-average temperatures.
