

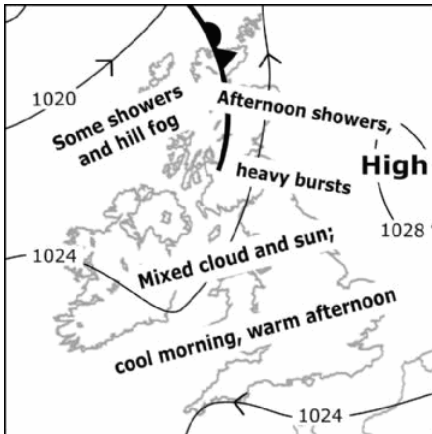
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Sunday, 26 April, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 26 April, 2026

Showers in Scotland spread east, turning heavy afternoon. Fog lowering to high terrain in the west Highlands, becoming cooler here. Patchy dawn mist England and Wales, a broader low layer of sea fog east of the Pennines, lifting for clear hills; risk of a few late showers in north England. A cool start, becoming mild.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Mild, mixed cloud and sun; scattered afternoon showers

Detailed Forecast for Sunday, 26 April, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South-southwesterly 10-15mph, up to 20mph early in the day. Trending variable in direction and towards lower speeds.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small, through a notable breeze in the morning, some gustiness too (not just on high terrain).
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Spotty afternoon showers A few light showers drift over the hills from Cardigan Bay, the hills more often dry, and many hills entirely dry all day.
Cloud on the hills?	Likely cloud-free Patchy mist in east-Wales valleys, this soon dissipating after sunrise for cloud-free hills. Snowdonia may be cloud-free dawn to dusk.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Above 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often sunny, though weakened by high cloud, which may thicken at times. Very good visibility, some haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9 or 10C. Starting several degrees cooler in the valleys, rising to 17C, or locally warmer east Wales.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northerly 10-15mph; may shift northeasterly afternoon, notable gusts to 20mph. Fairly small, though some inconvenient gusts over high terrain at times.	Northeasterly 10-20mph. Notable gusts, not just on high exposed terrain. Fairly small, but the strongest gusts may briefly impede walking.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Chance scattered showers, mostly dry Scattered showers here and there, greatest risk on northern slopes and eastern areas, but many hills stay entirely dry.	Scattered showers Occasional showers, mostly light, and largely in east Wales. A few showers may drift further west.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Banks lingering on high northern slopes Banks of cloud at various elevations from dawn, lifting to mostly 800-900m and up through morning and becoming well-broken towards mid-Wales. Northern slopes and high tops of Snowdonia more often capped. 60%	Passing caps over summits A layer of cloud above 600m early, most extensive eastern hills, this lifting through morning to just high terrain. Breaks off high summits are probable, but banks will return to highest summits at times too. Rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Often sunny mid-Wales, more often cloudy north Snowdonia, then a patchwork of sun afternoon. Very good visibility, though an early haze.	A patchwork of cloud and sun, best chance of extended sun breaks west. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	7 or 8C. Above the summits.	4 to 7C. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Monday, 27 April, 2026

Monday is likely showery, risk heavy with lightning in England. An easterly wind then gradually establishes in England and Wales, chilly nights and mornings with patchy dawn mist and light frosts, this soon fading for warm days. High pressure remains dominant through the week: regularly sunny and pleasantly warm days; summit temperatures often at or above 10C, many valleys will warm toward 20C or higher afternoon. Risk of sunburn in strong sunshine and very dry springtime ground conditions with high risk of wildfire.

Detail becomes uncertain into next weekend, but a rising risk of showers and longer spells of rain, mostly England and Wales, and likely turning cooler into the following week as wind shifts northerly.
