

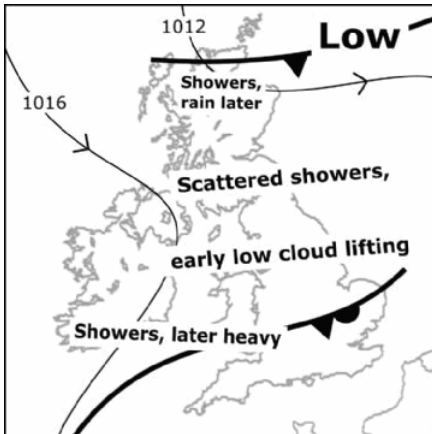
# Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Includes all summits in the the northern half of Wales from Pumlumon northwards.



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## General Summary for Monday, 4 May, 2026



### British Mountain Summary:

**Based on forecast chart for noon 4 May, 2026**

Showers soon drifting into northwest Scotland, cloud spreading onto western high terrain, and rain later more widespread across northern Scotland. Scattered showers in southern Scotland and afternoon in England, early low cloud but many summits clearing. Some showers in Wales, mostly south with heavy bursts afternoon.

Afternoon showers west; most hills become cloud-free

## Detailed Forecast for Monday, 4 May, 2026

<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	North-northeasterly 5-15mph, trending towards the higher end of the range with time.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Small, but trending breezy on the high summits later.</b>
<b>How wet?</b> (Precipitation and its impact)	<b>Some afternoon showers</b> The morning will be dry, possibly briefly drizzly in cloud on high tops. Through afternoon, a rising risk of showers on slopes facing the Llyn Peninsula, and coastal slopes south of here. A risk of a heavier shower towards mid-Wales.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Clearing most summits, but lingering on high north slopes</b> After dawn, cloud likely to be widespread on higher areas, particularly east Wales; some fog into sheltered valleys. Cloud base rises through morning, clearing summits south of Snowdon and Carneddau; banks linger on northern slopes above 700-800m; some risk of cloud returning to tops further south in showers.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>70%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Patches of sunshine, a greater chance of extended sun breaks through afternoon. Visibility very good.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>	4C rising to 6C, or locally 7C on hills south of Snowdonia NP.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits.

	<b>Tuesday 5 May</b>	<b>Wednesday 6 May</b>
<b>How windy? (On the summits)</b>	Northerly 10-15mph, sometimes less.	Southeasterly, 15 to 20mph, some gustier spots 25mph.
<b>Effect of wind on you?</b>	<b>Mostly small.</b>	<b>Fairly small, but feeling noticeably chillier if exposed to wind on higher tops.</b>
<b>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</b>	<b>Substantially dry</b> A chance of sparse light showers, though most hills stay dry.	<b>Local showers</b> Risk of a little patchy light rain from time to time during the day. Scattered showers more likely in afternoon, moving northwest, but some places stay largely dry.
<b>Cloud on the hills?</b>	<b>Mostly just northern hills</b>  Low cloud to 500-600m in north Snowdonia/Carneddau in the early morning, patches on higher terrain further south. Much of the cloud lifts and dissipates for clear hills, but patches continue to drift onto high northern slopes through the day.	<b>Covering some slopes at times, lifting</b>  Some varied cloud around mid to upper slopes in the morning, larger banks if any rain occurs. Much cloud lifting to the tops and breaking above into afternoon, but some ragged patches return in showers.
<b>Chance of cloud free summits?</b>	<b>80%, 60% northern slopes</b>	<b>70%</b>
<b>Sunshine?</b> Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine breaking out through morning for at least several hours, then a patchwork afternoon with fair weather cloud. Very good visibility.	A little sun, perhaps often a rather cloudy sky; sun mainly near coasts afternoon. Visibility excellent.
<b>How Cold? (at 900m)</b>	3 or 4C, may locally rise to 5C, greatest chance mid-Wales.	3C, rising to 5C afternoon.
<b>Freezing Level</b>	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

**Planning Outlook****All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 5 May, 2026**

Chilly most or all week, particularly across the Scottish Highlands where fresh snow in some areas and morning freezing level sometimes below 700m; patchy frosts developing in the glens and corries, though always thawing soon after sunrise. Wednesday is likely the chilliest day. Mixed weather with showers drifting around the country, though total rainfall will be fairly small. Wind often light as well, though variable afternoon breezes will form, particularly around showers where gusts may be suddenly strong. Local low fog in the mornings, typically lifting towards high terrain, often above summits though regions for best breaks are uncertain; often cloud with just glimpses of sun for most. Next weekend is indicated to be wet in Wales and England; detail remains uncertain in Scotland.
