

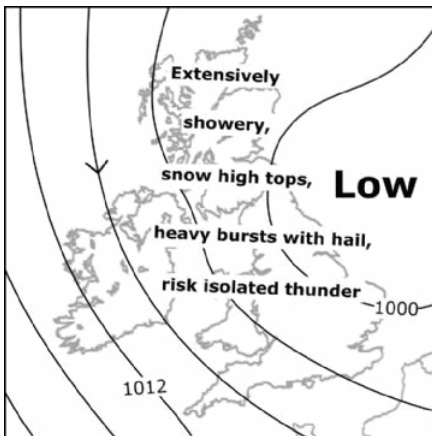
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Wednesday, 13 May, 2026



British Mountain Summary:
Based on forecast chart for noon 13 May, 2026

Cold for the time of year, with a cyclonic and unstable north-westerly bringing an increasingly widespread showery day across the hills. Showers heavy, with hail and risk of isolated thunder. Snow falling above around 700m. Gusty north-westerly winds, particularly strong and turbulent in and around the showers.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Cold, windy and showery. Showers heavy, with hail and snow tops; risk thunder.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 13 May, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West to northwesterly 30 to 45mph, gusts in excess of 50mph at times in and around showers.
Effect of wind on you?	Significant wind chill, very blustery, strenuous walking on high terrain, buffeting gusts making balance challenging.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showery, hail, snow high tops Showers all day, most frequent toward coastal areas early morning, but soon widespread, heavy bursts with hail, risk isolated thunder; snow at times falling on tops mostly above 700m.
Cloud on the hills?	Varying over tops Banks of cloud often covering higher areas in the north and west above 800m in the morning, tending to lift higher with breaks above even the higher tops, but ragged patches to 600m in showers.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Brief bursts of sun and intermittently excellent visibility, but suddenly very poor during showers, appalling if in snow/hail and cloud on tops.
How Cold? (at 900m)	0C rising to 3C. Wind chill feeling like -12 to -15C.
Freezing Level	Around 900m early morning, rising above summits, but lowering briefly near high tops in showers.

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 14 May	Friday 15 May
How windy? (On the summits)	Northwesterly 25 to 30mph, stronger squally gusts in showers.	Northerly 15 to 25mph, strongest around dawn when perhaps some tops up at 30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Considerable wind chill for mid-May. Ease of walking and sometimes balance affected on exposed high terrain.	May impede walking at times, mainly in the morning when the wind chill factor will be most pronounced.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers, some hail, snow high tops Showers most frequent near to north facing coasts in morning, but extending well inland and developing widely, some heavy with hail. May merge into longer spell of rain, or above 900m snow.	A few showers, transferring inland. A few showers, perhaps some hail, with snow over the tops initially. Showers well scattered and generally transfer through day from the coast to well inland.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive across the tops. In the north-westerly wind, whilst the cloud bases will vary, they will frequently cover higher terrain above 700-900m, patches to 500-600m at times.	Frequent patches covering tops Frequent patches or banks of cloud will cover higher tops, especially in Snowdon Range. Elsewhere, rising bases, resulting in tops often clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun limited mostly to well inland early in the day, then as fleeting glimpses between the showers. Visibility very good, but poor in showers.	Patchy sun, best early morning and west coast afternoon. Visibility very good, but lowering in showers.
How Cold? (at 900m)	1C. Feeling like -10C directly in wind.	1 or 2C. Feeling near-10C directly in early wind.
Freezing Level	1000m	Around 1000m, rising just above tops.

Planning Outlook**All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 14 May, 2026**

Staying notably chilly for mid-May through this week as air from the north-northwest prevails, with showers heavy at times and containing hail with snow over the tops, but over the weekend a front will edge in and bring a change to westerly winds.

Next week may see ridging across England and Wales giving drier conditions, but occasional rain and blustery south-westerly winds for Scotland.
