

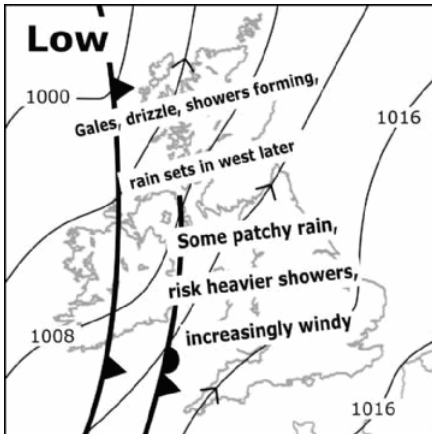
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Includes all summits in the the northern half of Wales from Pumlumon northwards.



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General Summary for Saturday, 27 June, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 27 June, 2026

Widely windy, afternoon gales across Scotland, possibly Lakeland and Snowdonia too. In Scotland, drizzle gives way to showery rain, setting in late in the day over western hills. Patchy rain England and Wales with dry windows and warm sunny moments, but a rising risk of showery bursts through afternoon, locally heavy.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Risk afternoon gales; often dry, risk afternoon showers

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 27 June, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South-southwesterly 25-35mph, speeds always strongest west where likely to strengthen, sustained speeds up to 45mph for several afternoon hours and stronger gusts over highest tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Expect strenuous walking conditions, more challenging over high terrain and western hills with buffeting gusts knocking you off balance. Feeling chilly.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some patchy rain, risk heavier showers Some drizzle on high tops in cloud early. Patchy rain drifting from the southwest from time to time, an odd heavier burst possible, then a rising risk of extended and heavier falls in the later afternoon, particularly west.
Cloud on the hills?	Varied, mostly west and where rain occurs Varied cloud banks, most frequent over west coastal slopes, fairly extensive to middle slopes early. Some patches lower down inland in morning. A lifting and breaking tendency, a few afternoon hours of banks just above 700-800m, or perhaps largely clear. Filling in over high tops should rain return, patchy lower banks.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 50%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mixed cloud and sun, likely an extended sunny period afternoon, best chance east-Wales. Some mistiness in morning. Visibility often good, but turning poor should rain occur.
How Cold? (at 900m)	13 to 15C, small variation all day. Still rather humid. Feeling like 5C in direct wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	West-southwesterly 20-25mph, sometimes gusting 30mph over tops, later sustained 30mph and trending westerly. Fairly small, but gust impact ease of walking, perhaps more consistently impeded later in the day.	Westerly trending southwesterly 10-15mph, stronger early, sustained 20mph around dawn. Mostly small, some breezy moments early in exposure.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Morning rain, substantially dry afternoon From before dawn, several bands of rain pass west-to-east, brief heavier falls likely in the morning. From midday onward, largely dry, some risk of light spots of rain drifting onto western hills.	Patchy rain, afternoon showers, drier east Light patchy rain drifts onto west slopes from dawn, mostly light with dry windows, more frequent on higher west aspects. Some risk of showery bursts forming afternoon. Very little rain reaches east hills.
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting and breaking trend afternoon Fairly extensive through much of morning, to most middle slopes, or lower western slopes with ragged lower patches in the early morning. From noon, a rising and breaking trend, to banks above 800m with increasing breaks.	Lifting to high terrain with breaks Banks of cloud at multiple elevations at dawn, most extensive west aspects where banks may reach lower slopes. Lifting through morning, to largely just banks over tops afternoon, and breaks probable; briefly lower again if showers occur.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%, rising afternoon to 60%	40% rising to 70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy morning breaking into a patchwork of cloud and sun afternoon. Visibility becoming very good.	A patchwork of cloud and sunshine, some variable thin high cloud around. Very good visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	10 or 11C, cooling later afternoon to 9C. Above the summits.	9C rising to 12C. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 28 June, 2026

Cooler on Sunday as the weather pattern returns to an Atlantic influence. Bands of rain sweep eastward early Sunday, followed by fresher, sunnier weather with some patchy showers in the north and west. This westerly Atlantic pattern dominates next week: high pressure south and low pressure north will bring alternating periods of rain punctuated by bright sunshine. Wind generally on the strong side with mild to sometimes warm temperatures, though cooler and windier spells at times produce significant wind chill on Scottish tops. Day-to-day detail currently uncertain, but western hill groups from Lakeland northward will see the most cloud and patchy rain, while east and southern areas likely drier and sunnier. This pattern is indicated to continue into the following weekend.
