

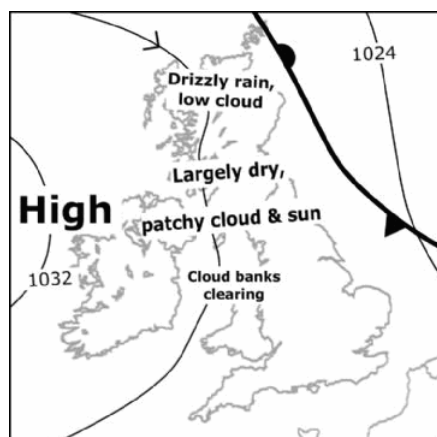

General Summary for Wednesday, 22 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 22 July, 2026

Dull and damp for northern Scotland much of the day, low cloud blanketing the hills, fresh northwesterly winds, feeling cool. Drier and better cloud breaks southward across the Highlands. Some cloud on hills in northern England and Wales tending to lift and break, some warm sunshine.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Early damp low cloud, improving. Moderate breeze.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 22 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Northerly 15 to 25mph, some gusts 30mph higher tops in northern areas in the morning, shifting northeasterly afternoon.
Effect of wind on you?	Feeling breezy and quite cool over higher terrain, starting to affect ease of walking and balance on exposed high ridges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Damp start toward north Drizzly patches briefly over northern slopes in the morning, largely fading into middle of day, but an odd light shower possible inland in the afternoon.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Early low cloud lifting and clearing Cloud banks early morning most widely over northern hills, possibly to 500-600m for a time, 700m and more broken further south; highest tops near or above top of cloud sheet. Rising to 800-900m then increasingly breaking up into middle of day. Local patches may linger for longer Carneddau. 50% rising to 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, some sun breaking through, best mid-Wales. Visibility reduced around early dampness, then very good below cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	10C in cloud early in day, rising to 13C. Feeling like 3 to 5C directly in the wind on high tops. Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly 10 to 15mph, often less toward mid-Wales. Tending to increase into evening-night to 20-25mph. Small during day.	West or northwesterly 20 to 25mph, at times 30mph higher northern tops, speeds tending to rise slightly later in day. Breezy over the hills, starting to affect ease of walking in some exposed spots. Noticeable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Generally dry Small chance a brief light shower mainly afternoon.	Rain unlikely Chance of a brief patch of drizzle mainly hills around Llanberis.
Cloud on the hills?	Patchy cloud lifting and breaking Local mist in valleys, patchy cloud banks from dawn, soon mostly above 700m. Cloud base rising toward then above most higher summits by midday, odd patches above 900-1000m.	Sometimes capping high tops Patches of cloud drifting over hills toward west and northern coasts, mostly above 800m, breaking above tops for periods. More often clear toward eastern tops.
Chance of cloud free summits?	60% rising to 80%	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of cloud and sun, best toward the coast in the afternoon. Visibility very good.	Cloud and intermittent sun, best in eastern mid-Wales. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	10 to 12C, little change all day Yr Wyddfa / Snowdon group, rising to 16C mid-Wales. Above the summits.	9C rising to 11C. Feeling like 2 to 4C directly in the wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 23 July, 2026

Westerly winds strengthen widely later this week, reaching gale-force over Scottish tops on Friday; low cloud across western Scotland, drizzle and steadier light rain, turning heavier later Friday. A swathe of persistent rain and strong winds moving southwards across Britain into Saturday, leaving a legacy of showers for Scotland, winds tending to lessen. Further areas of showers into Sunday. A changeable westerly pattern into next week and likely into early August, bringing spells of rain and showers; varying wind speeds, strengthening at times to gales on high tops. Often cooler for Scotland, a mix of cooler and warmer days for England & Wales.
