

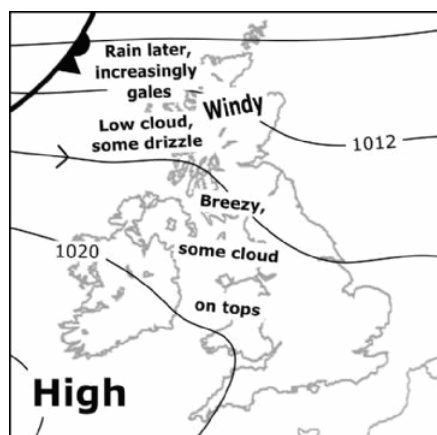
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Friday, 24 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 24 July, 2026

Strong westerly winds, reaching gale-force on Scottish tops, increasing later. Low cloud and some drizzle in western Scotland, drier and some cloud breaks further east. More persistent rain develops from the northwest later. Largely dry England & Wales, some cloud capping high western tops.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Largely dry, some cloud capping tops. Moderate breeze.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 24 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	West or northwesterly 20 to 25mph, lowest speeds toward mid-Wales, speeds tending to rise slightly later in day, reaching 30mph higher northern tops. Rising slightly further up to dawn on Saturday to 35mph. Breezy over the hills, starting to affect ease of walking in some exposed spots. Noticeable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely Chance of a brief patch of drizzle mainly hills toward north coast in the morning.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Sometimes capping high tops Patches of cloud drifting over hills toward west and northern coasts in morning, mostly above 800m, breaking above tops for periods, increasingly broken afternoon. More often clear toward eastern tops. 60% rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloud and intermittent sun, best in eastern mid-Wales; sunnier widely afternoon. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	10C rising to 12C, up to 15C mid-Wales. Feeling like 3 to 7C directly in the wind. Reaching 25C eastern valleys mid-Wales. Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25 to 35mph, at times 40mph with some stronger gusts over higher northern mountains morning to midday.	West-northwesterly 20-30mph, with time trending more northwesterly and towards higher speeds.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous walking and marked chill over the hills, buffeting gusts making balance challenging on exposed ridges.	Ease of walking impacted, more strenuous on high terrain later and feeling chilly.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and drizzle Rain developing from the north during morning, a mix of drizzle and periods of persistent rain over western hills into afternoon, staying generally damp into evening; patchier small amounts of drizzly rain further east.	Showery rain Often raining over high terrain of Eryri/Snowdonia NP and north and western areas. Further east, the rain more showery, but at times more frequent too.
Cloud on the hills?	Lowering to become extensive Patchy cloud banks at first northwest areas, hills toward mid-Wales start clear, but cloud likely to lower widely as rain develops, blanketing hills to lower elevations in west, 500-700m inland/east.	High terrain stays shrouded Terrain above 800m likely in cloud most or all day, more widely extensive to mid-slopes early. A few higher breaks, but also widely lowering during more showery periods. Slopes towards the west and north coasts more often shrouded.
Chance of cloud free summits?	50% dropping to 10%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Initially high cloud and fairly bright, good visibility if dry, but deteriorating to cloudy dull conditions, misty poor visibility west.	Best bursts of sun towards east Wales. Varied visibility, very good where out of cloud and rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	11C, up to 13C eastern tops afternoon. Feeling near to freezing directly in the wind.	10 or 11C. Feeling like 1 to 3C in strongest wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 25 July, 2026

Westerly winds prevail this weekend and early next week, then southwesterly into midweek, bringing spells of rain, drizzle and some showery falls; low cloud persistent across hills, particularly in the west. Upland gales early on Saturday tend to lessen, but staying breezy; lower wind speeds for Scotland on Sunday. Rather cool this weekend and Monday, single-figures Celsius on high terrain. Then more humid, and warmer, especially England & Wales. More prolonged heavier rain possible for western Scotland Monday-Tuesday, risk of gales again on high tops. More uncertainty later in the week as a slow-moving area of low pressure is nearby, but risk areas of heavy rain and showers.
