

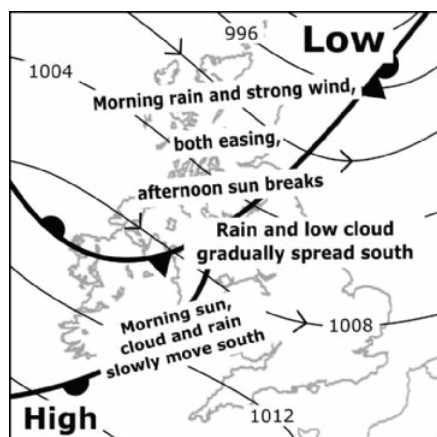

General Summary for Saturday, 25 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 25 July, 2026

Windy early, gale-force gusts in Scotland with significant wind chill. Morning rain in Scotland slips south into north England by midday, patchy sun breaks out in Scotland. Morning sun in Wales, rain reaching here through afternoon from north. Most rain on western hill groups where cloud will become extensive.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Blustery; early sun, increasingly cloudy and drizzly

Detailed Forecast for Saturday, 25 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 25 to 35mph, at times 40mph with some stronger gusts over higher northern mountains around midday hours. Easing tendency into evening towards 25mph, locally lighter.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous walking and marked chill over the hills, buffeting gusts making balance challenging on exposed ridges, perhaps more widely arduous for a few midday hours.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Afternoon drizzly rain A few spots of rain through morning on northwestern hills but more often dry. Through afternoon, drizzly over high tops with periods of light rain over western hills, staying generally damp into evening; patchier small amounts of drizzly rain further east.
Cloud on the hills?	Lowering to become extensive Patchy cloud banks at first northwest areas, hills toward mid-Wales start clear, and Snowdonia summits seeing breaks for a few hours. Cloud lowers widely as midday approaches, blanketing hills to lower elevations in west, 500-700m inland/east.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80% dropping to 10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Initially mostly sunny with good visibility, deteriorating to cloudy dull conditions, misty with poor visibility west.
How Cold? (at 900m)	11C rising to 13C. Feeling near to freezing directly in strongest wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 26 July, 2026

West-northwesterly winds prevail this weekend and early next week, transitioning to southwesterly through mid-to-late week, bringing spells of rain, drizzle and some showery falls; low cloud persistent across hills, particularly in the west. Lower wind speeds for Scotland on Sunday, staying quite breezy England and Wales. Rather cool this weekend and Monday, single-figures Celsius on high terrain. More prolonged heavier rain possible for western Scotland Monday-Tuesday. More humid and warm into mid and late week, especially England & Wales which could become hot later in the week. More uncertainty later in the week as a slow-moving area of low pressure is nearby, but risk areas of heavy rain and showers into next weekend as well.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2026.
