

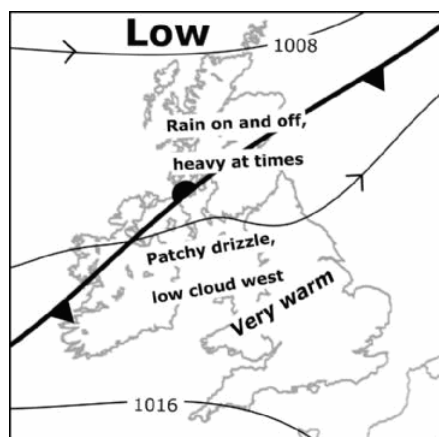

General Summary for Wednesday, 29 July, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 29 July, 2026

A swathe of frequent to persistent rain through central & southern Scotland, some heavier bursts with possible thunder and lightning afternoon. Patchier showers in northwest, rather cool here. Warmer and humid southwards, low cloud covering many western hills, some drizzle near Irish Sea.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Breezy. Damp low cloud coastal hills, local showers.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 29 July, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 20 to 30mph, gusty in places over higher terrain.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery over the hills, affecting comfortable walking at times on higher exposed tops and ridges.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Local drizzle, chance a late shower Some drizzle around low cloud on hills near Cardigan Bay. Chance of an isolated showery burst of rain inland later in day. A band of rain moves in from west into night, risk thunder.
Cloud on the hills?	Most widely early in day, persistent low cloud west coast hills Cloud banks to lower elevations on coastal hills in west, tending to thin but likely to linger around some western slopes all day. Further north and east, patchier cloud, more often clearing afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% west coast, rising to 70% north/east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy and misty in west, may improve at little. Sun and varied high cloud further east, visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	12C rising to 15C where not in cloud, or 17C mid-Wales. Some valleys reach 25C or above toward east; quite humid.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 20 to 25mph, at times 30mph higher northern tops.	West to southwesterly 15 to 25mph, strongest northern tops, at times 30mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Affecting ease of walking and balance on exposed high tops and ridges. Marked wind chill.	Starting to affect comfortable walking at times on higher tops and ridges. Noticeable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early showers clear A band of showery rain around dawn, may leave scattered showers into morning, but soon clearing east to be largely dry. Light showers possible by dusk in west.	Brief local showers One or two showers passing west to east.
Cloud on the hills?	Early patches lifting and clearing Patchy cloud banks over mountains, most in western areas early morning, bases soon rise and break above tops, largely clear middle of day onward. Patches may return in west by evening.	Capping tops in morning, lifting Patchy cloud soon mostly above 700m early morning, lifting toward higher tops, may come and go for a few hours, but increasingly clearing into afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	80%	70%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy start, then sun breaking through, increasingly sunny afternoon. Visibility very good.	Patchwork of cloud and sun; coastal areas sunnier afternoon onward. Visibility very good.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 to 9C. Feeling near 0C in exposure to wind.	7C rising to 9 or 10C afternoon. Feeling nearer 0C in the wind on tops.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 30 July, 2026

Cool and showery westerlies late this week and into Saturday, windy over high terrain; western hills often capped in cloud. Rain may encroach from the southwest on Sunday, winds turn southerly and warmer air wafts back across England and Wales at least. A complex area of low pressure is then expected to circulate slowly over Britain early next week, bringing areas of rain and heavy showers, some thundery downpours possible. Winds varying, may strengthen northwesterly by Tuesday to gales. An improving trend into midweek, but showery westerlies likely prevail in Scotland at least. Despite spells of rain, beware ongoing fire management restricting access to some mountains.
