

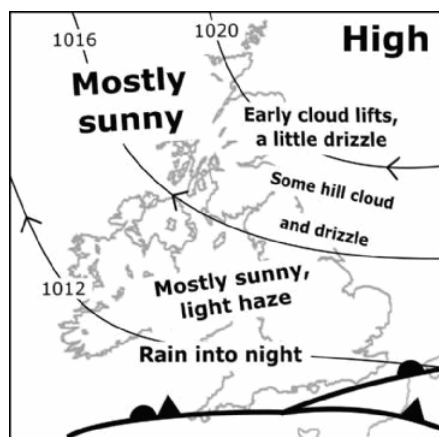

General Summary for Tuesday, 25 August, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 25 August, 2026

Early cloud and drizzle in northeast England and east Scotland. Cloud lifts, sun breaking out; cloud caps cling to high east Scotland tops, a little light rain passing westward. Wales and west parts of England and Scotland largely dry with little hill cloud. Wind strengthens into night in England and Wales.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Breezy, often sunny; rising risk rain and stronger wind into night

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 25 August, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	East-southeasterly 20 to 30mph, trending towards the lower end of the range for a time. Strong gusts in the morning over tops and downslope approach 40mph or stronger.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small much of the day, but blustery on high terrain, ease of walking becoming affected, particularly in early gusts which will impact balance.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely Chance of a little fine drizzle where in early cloud banks in east, but soon dry. Afternoon into evening, possibly an odd burst of rain moving up from the south, increasing chance into night.
Cloud on the hills?	Little or none Patchy cloud banks on some eastern slopes for a few hours from dawn will all clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sun and thin high cloud. Visibility very good west, slight haze looking eastward.
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C rising to 15C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Wednesday 26 August	Thursday 27 August
How windy? (On the summits)	Southeasterly 25-30mph and gusty early in day, a gradual easing tendency.	Southeasterly 15-25mph, shifting southeasterly with time; quite gusty much of the day.
Effect of wind on you?	Early gustiness tending to ease to become fairly small.	Fairly small, but nuisance gusts affect walking at times through much of the day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early rain, risk thundery bursts later A risk of steady rain and drizzle over a few early hours, tending to clear northwards. During afternoon into evening, risk of heavier bursts of rain forming with possible thunder; timing of any rain is uncertain.	Often raining, thundery bursts Several hours of rain from dawn, heavy, thundery falls mixed in. Tending to break into showers with time, but localised thunderstorms could redevelop afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, lifting, but variable Cloud fairly widely shrouding hills above 500-600m from dawn, some lower banks toward east. Tending to rise and break, but patches may cling around some high tops, and variably lower where rain occurs.	Fairly extensive, local improvement Cloud from at least middle slopes upward in the morning, and likely lower with patches into valleys during rain. Lifting, but slopes towards Cardigan Bay will be slow to clear above 700-800m, and high tops may not clear.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20% rising to 50%	10% rising to 40%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional weak sun through high cloud, often overcast. Hazy start, visibility improving to be good when dry.	Overcast and often dull in the morning with poor visibility, breaking into patchy sunshine with very good visibility out of showers.
How Cold? (at 900m)	12C rising to 14C, quite humid. Feeling like 5C in the wind at first.	11 to 13C, perhaps warmest in the morning; fluctuating by several degrees around showers.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 26 August, 2026

Low pressure to the south will develop and drift across Britain into the second half of this week bringing increasingly wet, warm, and humid conditions widely. Areas of rain will drift northward during Wednesday, possibly thundery showers forming over England & Wales. Heavy and thundery rain likely affects England, Wales & southern Scotland on Thursday-Friday, potentially prolonged heavy falls bringing a risk of flooding locally. Northwest Scotland likely driest. The eastern Highlands often covered in low cloud. Strong gusty easterly winds prevail for a few days through midweek. Into the weekend it remains unsettled with areas of rain and heavy showers, plus cooler northwesterly winds developing.
