

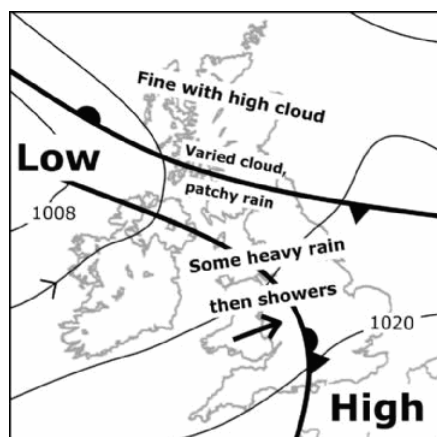

General Summary for Wednesday, 2 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 2 September, 2026

Much of the Highlands sees a fine day with fairly light winds; a veil of high cloud tends to thicken, risk of some rain later.

S Scotland & N England has more cloud, some rain. Heavier rain moves across Wales into Peak District, followed by showers on a strong southwesterly wind, quite humid.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Windy, gale-force gusts. Heavy rain then showers, low cloud.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 2 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	South-southwesterly 30-40mph, gusty over the tops, and briefly strengthening with gusts approaching 50mph around mid-late morning. Then southwesterly afternoon, often 30-35mph, rising again toward evening 40mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous walking in exposure much of the day, more arduous moments with considerable buffeting and wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Heavy rain then drizzle and showers Several hours of morning rain, heavy for a time particularly west. Rain will ease into patches and gradually fade to drizzle mixed with some showery bursts; where in cloud in west staying often damp.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive Cloud extensive from 600m upward in morning, often lower around rain, widely to 400m and lower towards Cardigan Bay. As rain eases, bases rise, some breaks approach 800m inland and east, but near west coast often staying lower.
Chance of cloud free summits?	20%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast and dull with poor visibility, some brighter skies into afternoon, better visibility inland where dry.
How Cold? (at 900m)	10C rising to 12 or 13C, staying elevated overnight; humid. Feeling like 2 to 5C in direct wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly 20-35mph, trending towards lower speeds for a time but then a swathe of strong wind arrives late, Walking impeded in exposure, feeling chilly, effecting easing somewhat but significantly deteriorating into night.	West-southwesterly 35 to 50mph, stronger gusts likely around or before dawn over 60mph for a time. Arduous walking conditions, frequent buffeting knocking you off balance on exposed terrain. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Some patchy rain, most later Some drizzle on high tops early, this fading, with patchy rain coming and going much of the day, some dry windows as well. More frequent rain develops toward evening, sets in persistently into night.	Early rain clears to light showers Overnight rain likely heavy for a time through toward dawn, then clearing to leave just residual patches of rain which may linger for a few hours in west, some light showers may come and go all day.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Fairly extensive, improving trend Hills extensively shrouded to low slopes to start, a gradual lifting trend, mostly east Snowdonia/Carneddau areas but bases may only approach 900-1000m, and remaining more extensive on west slopes. Will later fill in again more widely. Rising to 40%	Often capping higher western tops Cloud banks at varied heights from dawn, tending to lift and break early morning toward upper slopes, but patches then likely to come and go on tops all day, most often in west above 700-800m. Better breaks eastward. 30% rising to 60% eastern tops.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	A few bright glimpses but more often overcast. Locally good visibility where cloud lifts, more often poor on high tops and western hills.	Fairly cloudy, occasional sun mostly east. Visibility often good, but reduced at times in rain, mostly in west.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	12C, little change until later when approaching 14C for a few overnight hours. Above the summits.	7 or 8C, may be slightly milder at dawn. Directly in wind feeling like -3C. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 3 September, 2026

A series of weather systems moves in from the Atlantic this week and next to bring spells of rain and showers, accompanied by frequently strong to gale force mountain winds. A window of better weather is likely this Saturday for Scotland and northern England, but further rain is expected to move into Wales, which then extends north by Saturday night and Sunday, possibly widely heavy rain and a risk of more powerful upland gales developing over Scotland into Sunday. Temperatures will vary, mildest toward the south, but some cooler air moves in from the north at times bringing higher Scottish tops close to freezing point.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Tuesday, 1 September, 2026
