

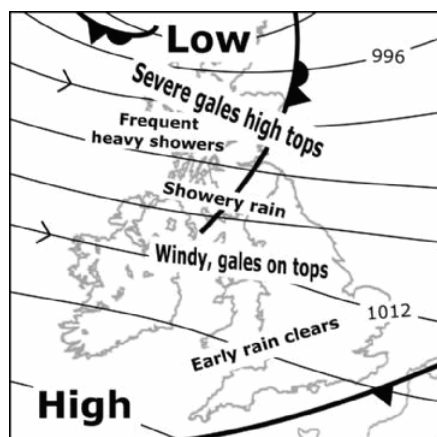

General Summary for Friday, 4 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 4 September, 2026

Gales over high terrain in all areas, severe on higher mountains making progress very challenging and feeling cold. Showery rain, most frequent in western Scotland, scattered heavy bursts passing eastward. Remnants of overnight rain soon clears from Wales to be more often dry, less windy southwards.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Windy, gales on tops. A little rain, then often dry.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 4 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 30 to 45mph, speeds fluctuating during day, strongest more often over northern tops, where gusts over 50mph at times.
Effect of wind on you?	Strenuous-to-arduous walking conditions, frequent buffeting knocking you off balance on exposed tops and ridges. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain at first clearing Overnight prolonged heavy rain clears around dawn, leaving it very wet underfoot and fast-flowing streams. Some residual patches of light rain over western hills, becoming more often dry from mid-late morning.
Cloud on the hills?	Often capping higher western tops Cloud banks at varied heights from dawn, tending to lift and break early morning toward upper slopes, but patches then come and go on tops all day, most often in west above 800m. Better breaks eastward.
Chance of cloud free summits?	Rising to 50%, or 70% east tops.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Fairly cloudy, occasional sun mostly east more frequent into afternoon as high cloud tends to thin. Visibility good, some coastal haze.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7 or 8C, little change all day. Directly in wind feeling like -3C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 5 September, 2026

Generally unsettled through the next week with spells of rain and showers moving in from the Atlantic, accompanied by frequently strong to gale force mountain winds. A window of better weather and less wind on Saturday, but further rain moves into Scotland from the southwest by Saturday night into Sunday, heaviest northwest Highlands; gales also return to many mountains by Sunday. Temperatures will vary, mildest toward the south, but cooler air moves in from the north at times next week bringing higher Scottish tops occasionally close to freezing point. Indications favour improving weather patterns during mid-month.

Forecasts are issued daily by 16:30 and are kept under review and amended as necessary. However, expected conditions can still change after issue. © Copyright Mountain Weather Information Service, 2026.
