

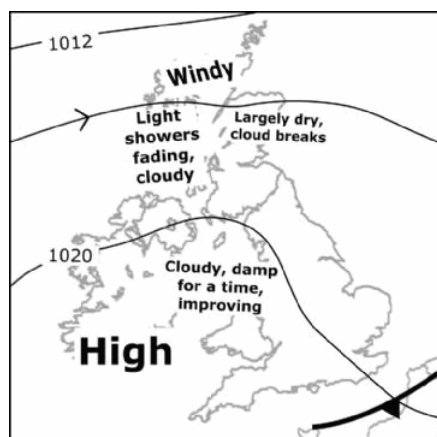
Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

General Summary for Friday, 11 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 11 September, 2026

Fresh westerly winds will be strongest in northern Scotland, speeds lessening a little during the day, but feeling cool in exposure on tops. Light showers mainly in western Scotland tends to fade. Cloud often capping western tops, breaks forming higher with time; clearer hills toward east.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Breeze eases. Some early dampness, cloud tends to lift.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 11 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	West-northwesterly 20-25mph to start, easing, to 10-15mph afternoon. Starting to increase again into night, later toward 30-40mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery and cool in exposure early in day, becoming mostly small. Tending to deteriorate onward through the night.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Soon dry A little drizzle over the high tops in cloud in the early morning, soon fading for dry hills.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive early, improving Most high terrain starts in cloud, bases towards middle slopes from Llyn Peninsula to Carneddau. Cloud will lift with time, breaks forming, soonest Berwyn group and increasingly widely. High Snowdon group summits will be slowest to clear into afternoon.
Chance of cloud free summits?	40% rising to 80% afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Sunshine increasingly breaks out. Good visibility, though a haze building.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8 or 9C, little change all day. Feeling near freezing at first on tops in wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Eryri / Snowdonia National Park - Looking Ahead

	Saturday 12 September	Sunday 13 September
How windy? (On the summits) Effect of wind on you?	Southwesterly, rising through dawn to 40-55mph, up to 60mph higher northern tops during the day, lessening into Challenging conditions with powerful gusts to some low levels; walking soon difficult on exposed tops, lasting most of day.	West-northwest 20-25mph at dawn, easing during morning, to 10mph by middle of day, later SW'ly. Rising again by evening. Feeling chilly in a fresh breeze early morning, becoming small most of day.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Heavy rain develops, sets in Rain initially patchy, but becomes more persistent northwestern Eryri in the morning, then more widely, heavier falls developing, setting in continuously, only likely fading from north during evening.	Soon substantially dry A little light rain or drizzle on northwest hills nearer the coast at first, but likely to fade.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Increasingly extensive Banks of low cloud over hills toward the west in the morning, some early breaks more north and eastern groups. Filling in and lowering widely in rain. 20%	Low cloud in morning lifts and breaks Cloud banks fairly extensive from dawn into morning, varied to some lower slopes in western areas; highest tops may be near top of the cloud layer for a time. Tending to thin and lift, to leave odd patches on high tops afternoon. 30% rising to 80%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, increasingly dull. Hazy, then widely poor visibility in rain	Variable sunshine and cloud, sunnier near coast afternoon. Visibility soon excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	10C rising to 12C. Feeling like -2 to -5C directly in wind. Above the summits.	7C rising to 10C during day, may rise a degree or so more into evening and night. Feeling near freezing in early wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 12 September, 2026

Changeable west-southwesterlies prevail through mid September; often windy, gale-force winds for periods over higher terrain. An active frontal system sweeps southeastward on Saturday with a sustained fall of rain, accompanied by upland gales for most places. Improving for better weather on Sunday, then wind and rain returns into Monday, staying showery into Tuesday. A mixed outlook likely continues later next week with rain most frequent in western Scotland. Temperatures varying, some cooler days especially in Scotland, but often fairly mild further south, at times quite warm and humid.
