

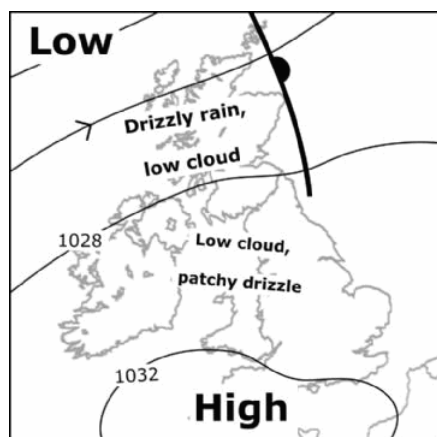

General Summary for Monday, 21 September, 2026



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 21 September, 2026

Warm and humid air across the country brings low cloud shrouding hills extensively, foggy to some lower elevations in the west. Some rain moves east across Scotland then generally damp air with fairly persistent drizzle over western hills. Strongest winds toward northern Scotland, gusty not just on highest tops.

Headline for Eryri / Snowdonia National Park

Gusty in places; drizzle, low cloud most persistent west.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 21 September, 2026

How windy? (On the summits)	Westerly 15 to 25mph, strongest gusts toward north in morning, tending to widely ease, in afternoon below 15mph most places, lower speeds mid-Wales.
Effect of wind on you?	Breezy morning on northern tops, starting to affect ease of walking and balance on exposed tops for a time, but becoming smaller.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A little drizzle Fine drizzle where in cloud feeling damp, particularly western hills; mostly dry toward the east.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free summits?	Lowest cloud fills in west, high tops at times poke out of cloud Blanket cloud shrouding many western hills, though variable for a few hours from dawn, clearer toward east. Filling in to some lower slopes near Cardigan Bay and tending to drift over hills inland above 600m. Highest tops above 900m near top of cloud sheet, may poke above at times. Best breaks remain from Carneddau and 20% west coast, to 50% east.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some sun mostly in east and at times northernmost areas, in places may emerge into sunshine and clear air if above cloud, but staying misty poor visibility lower down especially west coastal areas.
How Cold? (at 900m)	12 to 14C, little change into night; quite humid.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

	Tuesday 22 September	Wednesday 23 September
How windy? (On the summits)	South to southwesterly 10 to 20mph, strongest around higher northwest tops, some gusty areas 25mph.	Southwesterly 10-20mph, trending northwesterly, strengthening to 20-25mph, or briefly stronger over tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly small, but locally gusty which may feel more noticeable on exposed ridges.	Becoming blustery over the high tops, walking briefly impeded afternoon.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Damp air, drizzle mostly west Patchy drizzle mostly west coastal hills, feeling generally damp where in cloud. More often dry toward the north and east.	Morning rain, clearing afternoon Drizzly on high terrain in the early hours, patchy rain around, which may become more frequent for a few hours. Through afternoon, rain clears away to the east to become dry.
Cloud on the hills?	Low cloud most persistent near coast Varied cloud and fog banks from dawn, covering hills and in some valleys; highest summits may be above cloud early in day. Banks tend to drift higher up and gradually thin, best north and east. Low cloud likely to linger west coast.	Fairly extensive morning, well-clearing Most terrain above 600m shrouded much of morning, a few breaks but also more extensive for a time with ragged patches to forest canopies. Through afternoon, cloud lifts, and breaks up, little remaining by evening.
Chance of cloud free summits?	30%	20%, rising to 80% through afternoon
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, misty or hazy; some sun breaking through north and east, also some sun and clear air possible for a time on high tops above cloud.	Glimpses of sun, breaking out afternoon, mostly sunny by late in the day. Visibility becomes excellent as rain breaks.
How Cold? (at 900m)	11 or 12C, humid; little change into evening and night.	10C through morning, then cooling, to finish near 7C.
Freezing Level	Above the summits.	Feeling just above 0C in strongest wind. Above the summits.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 22 September, 2026

Rain affects western Scotland on Tuesday, patchier rain extending eastward. Then into Wednesday, a heavier swathe of rain moves east, more likely over England & Wales, clearing from the west leaving a few showers. South-southwesterly winds increase again on Thursday and rain may move into western Scotland, but elsewhere is likely dry. A variable outlook continues into next weekend and just beyond with high pressure building from the south at times with fairly warm and dry conditions, but some Atlantic systems still pass to the north bringing occasional rain and showers toward western Scotland at least. A trend toward drier conditions more widely around the change of month.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Sunday, 20 September, 2026
