

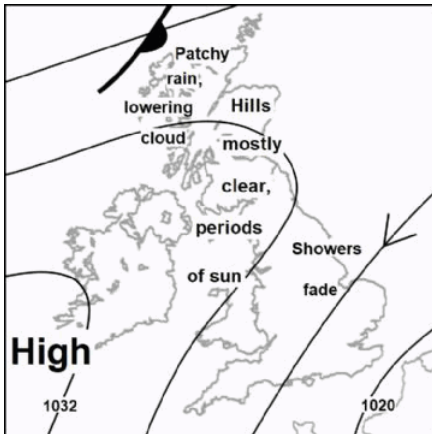
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Ben Alder, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 21 November, 2023



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 21 November, 2023

Many places dry during the day with some sun. Light winds in morning for the Highlands, but will increase, gales into evening. Cloud thickening ahead of a warm front, some patchy rain developing for NW Scotland. Brief showers for eastern Pennines fade. Windy for England and Wales in morning.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Light winds until late. Dry, cloud breaking.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 21 November, 2023

<p>How windy? (On the Munros)</p> <p>Effect of wind on you?</p>	<p>Little wind or weak northerly in morning, then becoming westerly 10 to 15mph in the afternoon, 20mph by dusk. Upland gales developing after dark, 50mph+.</p> <p>Mostly small, but increasing wind chill in the afternoon as the winds increase. Deteriorating after dark.</p>
<p>How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)</p>	<p>Dry until evening</p> <p>Dry all day. A little drizzle moving in from west evening into the night, mainly central highlands.</p>
<p>Cloud on the hills?</p> <p>Chance of cloud free Munros?</p>	<p>Mostly clearing</p> <p>Patchy low cloud at varying heights from dawn, mostly in east. Mist above some glens, but many hills clear.</p> <p>70%</p>
<p>Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)</p>	<p>A little weak sun breaking through for a time, but cloud layers increasing again from west. Visibility becoming very good.</p>
<p>How Cold? (at 900m)</p> <p>Freezing Level</p>	<p>1C lifting to 3C into the afternoon. Feeling colder as wind increases later.</p> <p>1000m, lifting above the tops into the afternoon. Frost in glens at first.</p>

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 22 November	Thursday 23 November
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 50 to 70mph; considerable increase of speed with height; likely increasing, risk 80mph later in day. Challenging conditions and significant wind chill at mid elevations; severe conditions higher up, any mobility very difficult.	West later northwesterly, 60 to 80mph from overnight into the daytime, only gradually easing toward 40-50mph. Ongoing very difficult conditions and significant wind chill from mid-heights upward much of day. Severe on tops.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain mostly central highlands Rain and drizzle most persistent west of the A9, generally damp all day. Progressively smaller amounts further eastwards, mostly spots in the wind, locally more often dry east of Glenshee.	Rain heaviest west, later snow tops Rain remaining most persistent central highlands, heavy for periods. On and off elsewhere, least in east. Later in day, turning to snow on the Munros as it eases. Showers with snow to 700m into night.
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive higher areas Shrouding higher terrain most or all day, lowest bases central highlands, at times below 700m. Further east, some breaks possible toward higher slopes.	Extensive higher areas Shrouding higher terrain most or all day, lowest bases west of the A9 in rain. Later as rain clears, bases starting to rise, some breaks may form late in day.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, glimpses of sun toward east. Slight haze, visibility reduced in rain, locally poor in west.	Mostly cloudy, glimpses of weak sun mainly east. Slight haze.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	6C. Wind chill feels near -10C on tops. Above the summits.	As high as 6C at first, dropping during day, later toward 0C. Wind chill feeling like -10 to -15C. Above the summits perhaps most of the day, but likely to start lowering from north, later in day possibly to 800-1000m.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 22 November, 2023

Wednesday into Thursday brings widespread gale force westerly winds over the mountains - increasingly severe. Very wet for western Scotland, particularly in northwest. Smaller amounts of rain further south and east. Colder air moves in from the northwest later Thursday into Friday, dipping below freezing on most high tops of Britain, showers with hail and snow falling to lower elevations in Scotland. Likely to stay chilly into the weekend, sub-zero on tops plus frost overnight into valleys and glens. Some local upland snowfalls possible, although high pressure nearby is likely to bring a fair amount of dry and bright weather plus wind speeds tending to ease.
