Continuing cold with higher areas below freezing point, particularly in the morning. Showers, mostly hail flurries developing, becoming frequent NW Scotland. Noticeable wind chill Wales. Very clear air.

Light wind. Hail flurries.

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southerly 10mph or less, but possibly 15mph east of Glenshee.

Cloud on the hills?	Summits extensively cloud free by midday		
	Cloud may well shroud higher slopes for several hours from dawn. By late morning only fragments shrouding higher slopes now and again in and after precipitation.

Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bursts of bright sunshine. Excellent or superb visibility.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	-1C post dawn. Rising to 4C by afternoon.		
Freezing Level	Widely below freezing point from valleys up post dawn; but by midday freezing level above the summits.

How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C after dawn but extensively 5C by mid afternoon. Will drop back to 0 or -1C in constant snow.	0C rising to 3 or 4C
Freezing Level	Widely near or below freezing valleys up at dawn. By late morning, tops above freezing point, but abruptly 800m in snow.	900m, gradually lifting above the summits from the south. Frost in some valleys at dawn.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 28 April, 2024

Less cold next week with freezing levels almost constantly above highest summits. Rain from time to time, particularly across Wales. Wind direction will be predominantly easterly. This will bring in frequent low cloud to more eastern mountains, with highest cloud base often near the west coast.
