

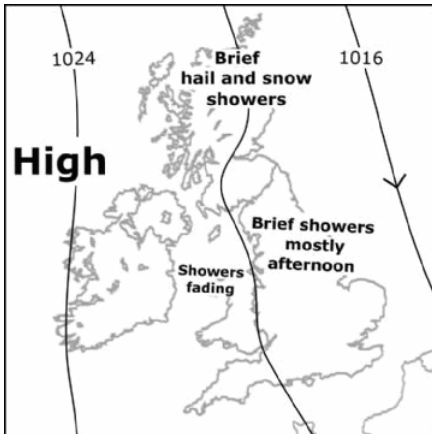
Southeastern Highlands

General Summary for Tuesday, 11 June, 2024



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 11 June, 2024

Staying chilly across the mountains, but a gradual lift of temperature above freezing toward highest tops. Northerly winds fairly light but still a distinct chill in the air. A scattering of brief showers with hail, but a lot of dry weather with very clear air and cloud clearing most tops.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Chilly breeze. Sun and scattered brief hail showers forming.

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 11 June, 2024

How windy? (On the Munros)	Northwest or northerly 15mph, but nearer 20mph near and east of Glenshee.
Effect of wind on you?	Small; although in the low temperatures will feel particularly cold in the wind.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	A few hail showers Brief hail or above 800m snow showers from late morning or midday.
Cloud on the hills?	Very little if any
Chance of cloud free Munros?	90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Bright sunshine in morning before cloud fills in. Excellent or superb visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m)	0C post dawn; rising to 3 to 6C by mid-afternoon, least cold toward central belt. Wind chill feeling like -4 to -8C, coldest in morning in east.
Freezing Level	900m post dawn; slowly lifting above all summits by early afternoon. Note: frost many glens at first.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 12 June	Thursday 13 June
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	West or northwesterly, 10mph or less. Negligible	South to southeasterly, 20 to 30mph, strengthening during the day from the west, risk reaching 45mph higher tops. Increasingly blustery over the mountains, likely deteriorating further to make walking arduous over exposed terrain.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Little or no precipitation Chance of isolated brief showers, mainly eastern areas in the afternoon, of hail on higher slopes.	Increasing risk of rain from west Dry start, possibly dry much of day in eastern areas, but an increasing risk of rain developing from the southwest, becoming persistent west of the A9. An odd patch of rain ahead of main rain area.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Very little 90%	Varied, some breaks; lowering in rain Banks of cloud over higher slopes in the morning, varied with some breaks to tops for a time. Then cloud base lowering across the hills as rain develops, forming to midslopes many areas. 50% dropping to 10% in rain
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloud gradually filling in. Superb visibility.	Glimpses of weak sun giving way to overcast skies from west. Very good visibility later reducing to be poor in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	0C rising toward 5 to 7C, highest in the central Highlands. 900m rising to above the summits. Frost widely into glens post dawn.	4 to 6C. Feeling sub-zero in the wind, near -5C as speeds increase. Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 12 June, 2024

Cold conditions will ease through midweek and winds will drop lighter. Low pressure approaching from the southwest by Thursday will see winds switch south to southeasterly and strengthen to gale force over west coastal mountains. Rain will move in from the west, becoming heavy. An unsettled outlook into the weekend and early next week as low pressure circulates slowly over the British Isles, bringing areas of rain and thundery showers. Wind speed and direction will vary, at times strong easterlies northern Scotland, west to southwesterly for Wales and Pennines. Temperatures will be higher, above freezing to tops, but not especially warm.

Forecast issued at 16:30 on Monday, 10 June, 2024
