
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Ben Alder, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Wednesday, 3 July, 2024



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 3 July, 2024

Wet day for most in the mountains, with low cloud and often windy conditions. Particularly in Scotland murky and chilly winds, persistent rain in the west, on and off in the east Highlands. In England frequent rain spells, in Wales mostly showers on the western coastal hills, fading toward the evening.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Frequent rain, especially west. Windy, becoming cold

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 3 July, 2024

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwest turning westerly, starting 25 to 30mph, likely increasing further later in daytime to 35-40mph on exposed hills. Challenging conditions on higher mountains, frequent buffeting, gusts affecting balance. Feeling distinctly cold.

How wet?	ow wet? Rain on and off	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Rain and drizzle on and off much of the day, most persistent central Highlands, some steadier rain as fronts move through in the morning. Smaller amounts east from Glenshee.	
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive higher areas	
	Often covering many Munros, for periods below 800m west of the A9. Some breaks higher up furthest east in the evening.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%	
Sunshine?	Overcast most of the day, a few breaks late afternoon.	
Air clarity (below cloud)	Visibility poor at times due to rain, some improvements, more often good in east.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	4 to 6C, dropping to 3C later in day. Wind chill feeling like -5C or later colder.	
Freezing Level	Above the summits, but only just above freezing on the highest summits by late evening.

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly 30 to 40mph on some higher peaks. Strengthening during the day. Gusts up to 55mph possible. Arduous, walking becoming difficult. Buffeting leads to highly affected stability and significant wind chill factor.	Southwesterly 15 to 25mph. Fairly small.
How wet?	Mostly dry start, showers afternoon	Becoming showery afternoon
(Precipitation and its impact)	Mostly dry in the morning, perhaps light rain west of A9. In the afternoon developing showers, heavy bursts locally in the west, east of Lochnagar only a few drops or staying dry.	At dawn drizzle confined to highest mountains, soon becoming dry, perhaps except Loch Tay surroundings. Afternoon little more widespread showers, but staying mostly dry east of A9 - although increasing risk of shower late afternoon.
Cloud on the hills?	Hills mostly clear, covering in showers	Highest tops covered
	West of A9 banks of clouds at times covering the tops, thickening and lowering in the afternoon. Toward the east cloud patches on various levels at start, soon breaking and clearing the hills, but returning in afternoon showers.	Cloud above most hills, but highest tops often covered. Cloud shrouding the hills more often west of A9 and in the afternoon in places of heavier showers.

Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, brief bright spells around and east of Lochnagar possible.	Patchwork of sun and clouds, best in the morning east of A9.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 4 July, 2024

Cooling in the night to Thursday, with sleet falling on highest Scottish peaks. A trough arriving on Thursday to Scotland brings another wet day on the Highlands with upland gales. England and Wales, although very windy and gusty, should get some sun between common showers, perhaps excluding Lake District and North Pennines, where clouds and rain still dominate. Damp, but generally much drier on Friday, some rain still in West and Northwest Highlands, in Brecon Beacons, Snowdonia and Peak District. Uncertain development further on, most likely fairly cold for the season. Chance for fine conditions during the weekend but unstable air may cause locally heavy showers or thunderstorms.
