
Southeastern Highlands

General Summary for Wednesday, 13 November, 2024



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 13 November, 2024

Mix of sun and often very low clouds covering the hills. In Highlands most sunshine afternoon, in Peak District and south Wales sunny most of the day. Southern Pennines and Lakes much sunnier than northern parts. Mild, light winds, chance for inversion conditions on the Munros.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Cloudy and mostly dull start, becoming sunny. Dry, breezy

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 13 November, 2024

How windy? (On the Munros)	West or northwesterly ranging from 20 to sometimes 30mph strongest toward north. 15mph near Central Belt.	
Effect of wind on you?	Mostly fairly small, although noticeable wind chill and walking sometimes impeded where exposed on higher summits.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	No rain expected	
Cloud on the hills?	Extensive on higher western areas, breaking afternoon	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Frequent fog above typically 700 to 900m, perhaps in rain patches nearer 500m, especially central highlands. Higher summits near and east of Glenshee may be covered only rarely. Some clearances afternoon. 30% rising to 70%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Cloudy with a little sunshine; often very good visibility. Afternoon becoming very sunny.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	8C, in wind feeling like near freezing.	
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 14 November	Friday 15 November
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Northwesterly, widely 10 to 20mph. Small.	Southwesterly turning westerly, strengthening form 30 to 50-55mph on high tops. Becoming gusty. Walking becoming very difficult, wind frequently throwing off balance, significant wind chill.
How wet?	No rain expected	Increasingly wet toward the evening
(Precipitation and its impact)		At first widely dry, occasional spot of rain west of A9. Toward the evening rain moving in from the northwest to most areas, in places fairly persistent (Ben Alder).
Cloud on the hills?	Mostly becoming covered	Extensive, breaks east
	Mist or fog in glens, partly clear upward at start, during the day soon cloud becoming extensive on higher slopes. Lower hills southeast of Pitlochry often staying clear most of the day.	Cloud covering higher tops all day, lower slopes may clear at times but likely in cloud most of the day. Some breaks possible first half of the day toward Glenshee.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	40%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine on the Highlands, toward Ochil and Angus hills sun much more frequent. Very good visibility.	Bright spells toward east, but most hills overcast.
,		Away from the cloud visibility excellent.
How Cold? (at 900m)	4 to 8C. Temperature generally rising with height.	5-6C, rapidly decreasing in the evening.
Freezing Level	Above the summits. Possible morning frost in some glens and often in depressions.	Well above the summits, but rapidly decreasing into the night to 900m.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 14 November, 2024

High pressure lasting until Friday, ending with a cold front coming from the northwest, what marks the end of fairly dry and mild period. On Saturday, the front will pass over Britain, reaching central England by the end of the day. bringing some rain to most hilly areas. Drastic cooling and big pressure drop behind the front. On Sunday and start of next week, in low pressure, frequent showers are expected, with snow on the hills, snowflakes even down to valleys and towns. In the Highlands snow may reach significant depths rapidly, meaning truly winter conditions fairly early in the season.

Forecast issued at 14:25 on Tuesday, 12 November, 2024
