
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Ben Alder, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Saturday, 26 April, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 26 April, 2025

Rain and low cloud will reach mainly western mountains ahead of a weakening front. Generally a slow improvement through the day as the rain increasingly fizzles out and away from south facing coastal hills, cloud base rises. Blustery Scottish Highlands, particularly NW.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Slowly improving: Rain tending to fizzle, cloud base rising.

How windy? (On the Munros)	South to southwesterly, in the range 30 to perhaps near central belt at times 40mph.	Southwesterly between 250 and locally 40mph, where very gusty.
Effect of wind on you?	Expect considerable buffeting and wind chill where exposed on higher areas.	Considerable buffeting and wind chill where exposed. Sudden gusts could unbalance you.
How wet?	Rain occasionally	A little rain; gradually clearing
(Precipitation and its impact)	Occasional rain, probably amounting to very little, particularly east of A9.	Rain and drizzle now and again will tend to ease to a few patches or completely dry - although timing of the improvement very uncertain. Little, if any rain at all toward and east of Glenshee and Ochils.
Cloud on the hills?	Most summits frequently or persistently cloud covered.	Very extensive, particularly morning
	Generally cloud base rising from 450 to 700m, generally highest near and east of Glenshee.	Persistent fog morning above 400 to 600m, will tend to lift slowly toward 600 to 900m although speed of change uncertain.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	Less than 10%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sunshine near and east of Glenshee. in rain, misty, although otherwise very good visibility.	Occasional sunshine, mainly lower slopes near and east of Glenshee. Visibility mostly very good, but dropping in rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	6C, but will feel as cold as minus 45C directly in the wind.	7C Will feel as cold as minus 4C directly in the wind near the coast,

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Sunday, 27 April, 2025

Much of Britain will be fine and sunny through much of next week. Temperatures, after being very warm, could well drop markedly on Thursday (Scotland) or Friday (England and Wales). Westerly winds in N Scotland may well maintain more mixed weather here, with occasional rain and cloud across higher summits.
