




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General Summary for Monday, 16 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 16 June, 2025

A front draped over the Highlands brings low cloud and drizzly rain to western areas, heavier rain pushing northwards in the afternoon. Southwesterly winds will strengthen later in Scotland, becoming gales on higher mountains by evening. Dry with sunny spells and cloud clearing the tops in England & Wales.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Windy on hills, strengthening later. Drizzle west, cloud breaks east.

Detailed Forecast for Monday, 16 June, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	West then southwesterly, 25-30mph, briefly stronger around dawn; lower speeds for a time middle of day, then toward evening increasing again to around 40mph, risk 50mph high tops into night.		
Effect of wind on you?	Expect increasing buffeting with height, although moderating for a time during middle of daytime, becoming more arduous later in day. Considerable wind chill.		
How wet?	Drizzly rain mostly west		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Drizzly rain most frequent western hills in the central highlands, patchier east toward the A9, amounting to very little near Glenshee, largely dry further east.		
Cloud on the hills?	Often covering central tops, breaks east		
	Most cloud above 700 to 900m, lowering further locally Trossachs to Loch Tay during rain. Bases rising eastwards, and tending to drift higher during day, clearing above 1100m for periods, especially afternoon.		
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30% central highlands, 70% further east.		
Sunshine?	Fairly cloudy, some sun through high cloud, mainly eastern areas.		
Air clarity (below cloud)	Visibility very good below cloud, mistier around drizzle toward west.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	9C rising to 12C afternoon.		
	Will feel only just above freezing point directly in the wind.		
Freezing Level	Above the summits.

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Tuesday 17 June	Wednesday 18 June
How windy? (On the Munros)	West to southwesterly 20 to 25mph, up to 35mph for a time around dawn.	West to southwesterly 25mph, occasional 30-35mph on higher tops.
Effect of wind on you?	Fairly small, but feeling cool on tops, more blustery at first.	Blustery over the mountains, may start to affect comfortable walking where exposed. Feeling noticeably chilly.
How wet?	Early showers fading	Rain unlikely
(Precipitation and its impact)	Showery rain early morning, more persistent drizzly rain mixed in for central highlands for a few hours, clearing to become largely dry and just a rare brief shower into afternoon.	
Cloud on the hills?	Lifting above summits	Mostly tops toward west
	Variable cloud above 900m early morning, mostly central highlands. Bases rising to higher slopes then increasingly breaking and leaving most cloud above the tops.	Banks of cloud mostly central highlands, bases around 800m at times, rising mostly above 1000m. More often above tops further toward and east of Glenshee.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	80%	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Patchwork of sun coming through. Visibility becoming excellent.	Glimpses of sun, best in east. Visibility very good below cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m)	8C, rising to 11C in east afternoon. Feeling sub-zero directly in the wind early in day.	6C, slight rise, up to 9C in east afternoon. Feeling sub-zero in wind, possibly nearer -5C on high tops in morning.
Freezing Level	Above the summits	Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Tuesday, 17 June, 2025

Humid southwesterly winds early this week brings low cloud and spells of drizzly rain to western hills. High pressure to the south will tend to expand northwards during midweek, with dry conditions and warm air for all regions, sunshine and fair-weather cloud. Winds becoming light south to southeasterlies later in the week. Uncertainty by next weekend into early the following week, a risk of some rain or showers returning as pressure tends to fall.

Forecast issued at 16:00 on Sunday, 15 June, 2025
