

Southeastern Highlands


The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Tuesday, 24 June, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 24 June, 2025

Frequent rain/drizzle onto most west coastal slopes, steadier rain for a time in the morning slipping east. High terrain mostly foggy, down to lower slopes in places along west coasts; best of breaks east Scotland and North Pennines. Blustery for most with risk of gales high terrain of England and north Wales.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Patchy rain and often foggy west; better east

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 24 June, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Westerly 20 to 30mph, strongest on higher summits toward the Central Belt, risk 35mph. Strongest winds in the morning and midday.
Effect of wind on you?	Starting to affect comfortable walking when walking on higher exposed terrain, some buffeting. Walking at times strenuous around Central Belt. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Patchy rain and drizzle, most often west/central Highlands Patchy rain and drizzle primarily west of A9; may persist for a few hours around midday towards central Highlands. Fading to drizzly showers. Only small amounts east of A9.
Cloud on the hills?	Often covering higher areas, breaks to higher terrain best east Fairly persistent above 900m central Highlands, may rise a little. Some breaks higher up eastwards, chance briefly clearing tops around Glenshee.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly cloudy, glimpses of sun, best in east. Visibility excellent below cloud away from rain.
How Cold? (at 900m)	7C, some local easternmost slopes a degree warmer. Feeling sub-zero on high tops in the wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits

Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Wednesday 25 June	Thursday 26 June
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Westerly, shifting southerly, 10 to 20mph. Fairly small.	Westerly 20-30mph. Shifting southwesterly into evening and rising towards 40mph, further deteriorating after dark. Walking impeded in strongest winds, becoming arduous into evening. Marked wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Rain unlikely during daytime Chance of an isolated drizzly shower. Overnight, rain likely to develop from the southwest	Rain for several hours early, clearing Bursts of rain for several hours at and after dawn, chance fairly persistent. Clearing for a dry afternoon.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Lifting to higher tops, some breaks Covering many upper slopes in the morning, particularly central Highlands, some breaks further east. Cloud base tending to rise and clearing for periods, but may cap tops even into afternoon. 60%	Breaking through morning, clearing tops High terrain west of A9 shrouded for several hours after dawn. Cloud more patchy to the east. Breaking later morning and lifting above the summits, caps only occasionally over highest summits near central Highlands. Becoming 90%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun, best toward east. Visibility very good out of cloud.	Gradually becoming mostly sunny through morning. Excellent visibility.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	7C, rising up to 10C afternoon. Above the summits	9 to 10C early, locally warmer east of A9. Cooling slightly central Highlands. Feeling near freezing in strongest wind. Above the summits

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 25 June, 2025

West to southwesterly winds prevail this week and a series of frontal systems come in from the Atlantic. Rain and drizzle most frequent in west with low cloud often covering hills, typically most extensive in Scotland. Higher cloud bases and drier further eastwards. Temperatures near average, or lower at times in Scotland. Often windy, risk of more extensive upland gales and some heavier rain as deeper areas of low pressure likely move in later in the week. Some indication of a brief settled spell into the weekend and rising temperatures, though northwest Scotland remaining at risk of frontal weather systems.

Forecast issued at 16:28 on Monday, 23 June, 2025
