
# Southeastern Highlands

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# General Summary for Thursday, 6 November, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 6 November, 2025

Mild and damp southerly air - lowest cloud on south-facing hills. Morning rain and drizzle in the Highlands easing off, some rise of cloud base. Gusty in places, strongest wind western Scotland. England sees little more than patchy rain or drizzle, whilst Wales has some pulses of heavier rain moving up from the south.

## **Headline for Southeastern Highlands**

Gusty in places. Rain / drizzle clears, low cloud across hills.

# Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 6 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southerly 20 to 30mph, strongest gusts around higher tops and some elevated passes.	
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery in places, gusts affecting ease of walking over some higher terrain.  Feeling cool in exposure despite mild air.	
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Early rain and drizzly patches fade Rain and drizzle fairly widely from dawn into the morning, tending to ease, drizzle lingering over some slopes mainly central highlands. Becoming drier overall into afternoon. Some patchy rain returns from south by evening. Wet underfoot, streams in spate.	
Cloud on the hills?  Chance of cloud free Munros?	Extensive Within a humid atmosphere, cloud banks will cover hills widely, but to varying levels. Scope for some breaks to form mainly between cloud layers. Base generally rising afternoon.  20%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Mostly overcast.  Visibility rather hazy, and poor in drizzle.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	8C. Feeling close to freezing directly in the wind.

How windy? (On the Munros)  Effect of wind on you?	South-southwesterly 15-20mph; stronger gusts likely over tops as the day goes.  Fairly small	Southeast trending southerly, 15 to 25mph, occasionally 30mph around higher summits, speeds locally varied.  Feeling breezy over higher terrain, but mostly modest effect on walking; some gustier locations more noticeable.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Chance of patchy rain west	A little drizzle
	A chance of patchy rain west of the A9, as well as some drizzle on the high tops in fog.	Pockets of drizzle, mostly over southern slopes. Possibly odd patches of rain occasionally toward west.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, some variability	Likely extensive, varied fog layers
	Fairly extensive across middle and upper slopes much of the day. Base will vary, rising somewhat after dawn with a few breaks mixed in, though returning to lower slopes too.	Shrouding the hills most or all day, some different fog layers possible, including some lower slopes in the morning. Above 600m likely staying covered, locally breaks to 800m Loch Tay, mainly northern slopes.

Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little sunshine expected. Visibility variable with cloud base, though excellent when out of cloud.	Rare if any weak sun. Mostly misty at various levels.

## **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 7 November, 2025

Staying mild with low cloud, drizzle and rain at times through into next week. Areas northeast of major hill groups seeing least rain and highest cloud breaks. Southerly winds of varied strengths, sometimes more blustery, approaching gale-force in exposed western areas. Some drier areas into the weekend, then a risk of heavier rain returning from the west, soonest into Wales and southwest Scotland on Sunday.

Further into next week, easterly winds are likely to develop for Scotland, bringing drier weather to the west, and potentially much colder with time. England & Wales may remain frequently wet under slow-moving low pressure.
