

Southeastern Highlands

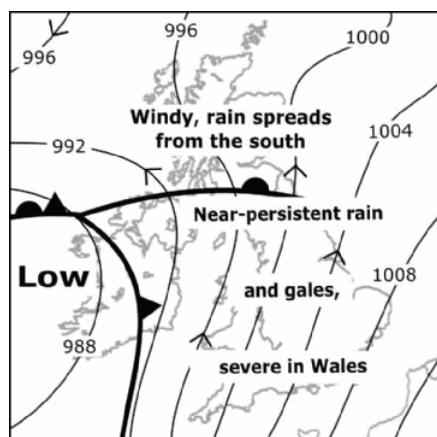

General Summary for Tuesday, 11 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 11 November, 2025

Rain from dawn in Wales soon spreads widely into England and southern Scotland, setting in for several hours; nearly constant all day for Lakeland and Galloway hills. Widespread gales as well, severe in Wales. A drier start for Scottish Highlands, though rain will spread from the south afternoon with strengthening wind.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Increasingly windy, risk gales later; afternoon rain

Detailed Forecast for Tuesday, 11 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Southerly at dawn 15-20mph, soon shifting southeasterly. Speed likely to strengthen during daytime, reaching a gusty 30-40mph, risk reaching up to 50mph though speeds will be variable into night. Expect increasingly arduous conditions, with balance challenges; very gusty, locally downslope toward north. Considerable wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Dry morning, then rain sets in widely The day starts dry. Rain arrives from the south around or after noon, spreading widely and becoming persistent; increasingly heavier falls setting in as well from the south.
Cloud on the hills? Chance of cloud free Munros?	Becoming extensive to low slopes as rain sets in Patchy cloud at various heights from dawn, more broadly covering high terrain in the south. Cloud lowers to extensively blanket the hills afternoon as rain sets in, reaching lower slopes in the south first. 30%, lowering to 10%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Some sunny bursts on lower slopes in the morning, soon shrouded by high cloud and hill fog. Visibility starts good but increasingly poor as rain sets in.
How Cold? (at 900m) Freezing Level	3C rising into afternoon to 5C, then from dusk 7C; only small fall with height. Feeling like -5C directly in the wind. Close to highest summits overnight, but by dawn well above the tops.

	Wednesday 12 November	Thursday 13 November
How windy? (On the Munros)	SW'ly then later a gustyNE'ly, 20-35mph. Speed and direction may vary considerably, possibly a lull developing.	Detail uncertain: northeasterly 35-45mph at dawn with stronger gusts possible; may ease later towards 30-35mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Beware changing conditions: occasionally small, but risk very blustery for periods with notable wind chill.	Walking arduous most of the day, may improve later - expect considerable buffeting and wind chill.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Risk of ongoing rain north Very wet underfoot with streams in spate and flooding following overnight and dawn rain. Rain may persist well into the day on northern mountains, trending to light drizzly rain further south and may fade.	Showery rain/snow, most in the east Detail uncertain: Pockets of showery rain west of A9, falling as snow above 600-700m - risk of periods of broader precipitation. East of A9, rain/snow showers more frequent
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive Shrouding the mountains widely, banks of cloud at varied elevations, in places to some lower slopes. Higher bases and local breaks toward the south, best in afternoon.	Mostly banks on high terrain, filling in at times Fairly extensive over high ground from dawn, mostly above 900m but locally lower. Will tend to break into banks of cloud clinging to hills, perhaps briefly clear tops, though intermittently becoming more sheet-like, particularly east of A9.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, a little weak sun may break through. Misty areas in morning, improving visibility, locally good in east.	Overcast, some bright breaks forming later in the day. Visibility variable: poor in snow/rain but very good during dry periods.
How Cold? (at 900m)	4 or 5C early, a slight drop as the day goes. Feeling like -5C if in stronger wind.	0C at dawn, may start slightly warmer around Callander. Lowering to -1C. Feeling like -10 to -13C in direct wind.
Freezing Level	Above the summits, may drop close to highest tops late in day, then lowering further to 1100m or lower overnight.	900-1000m at dawn, lowering to 800m.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Wednesday, 12 November, 2025

Periods of heavy rain for many over several day; further flooding for Wales, the Lakes and southwest Scotland. Cooler than recently in Scotland with freezing levels lowering to most high terrain, snow showers falling on high terrain from the north; remaining generally mild England and Wales by day and night.

Later in the week and into the weekend, high pressure draws colder air into Scotland and progressively further south into England and Wales over the weekend. Strong easterlies are likely over England and Wales and conditions will be largely dry with some clear hills and sunny bursts; overnight frosts likely widespread in Scotland. The weather regime the following week is uncertain but first indications suggest more unsettled weather.
