
Southeastern Highlands

The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Ericht, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Wednesday, 12 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 12 November, 2025

Northern areas of the Highlands generally wet, the rain only gradually breaking up. Showers for the southwest Highlands. Dropping below freezing on northern tops later. Heavy rain sets in again across Wales, already flooding expected after previous rain. Mostly dry for much of Pennines, Lakes & south Scotland.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Windy in morning. Showery rain, fading for a time.

Detailed Forecast for Wednesday, 12 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwesterly 25 to 35mph, strongest and most gusty in morning, tending to ease into afternoon, easing to 15-20mph up to dusk into early evening. Then into night switching northeasterly, reaching 40-50mph further into night.		
Effect of wind on you?	Blustery conditions, marked wind chill in morning, frequent buffeting for a time. Tending to ease into afternoon, mostly small late in day. Deteriorating overnight.		
How wet?	Showers, some more frequent rain		
(Precipitation and its impact)	Very wet underfoot with streams in spate and flooding following previous rain. Showery rain on and off into the daytime, breaking up to become scattered middle of day, but later risk more frequent rain drifting back southwards across the region.		
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive		
	Shrouding the mountains widely, banks of cloud at varied elevations, in places to some lower slopes. Higher bases and local breaks toward the south, best in afternoon.		
Chance of cloud free Munros?	20%		
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Largely cloudy, a little weak sun may break through. Misty areas in morning, improving visibility, locally good in east.		
How Cold? (at 900m)	4 or 5C early, a slight drop as the day goes, then to 0C into night. Feeling like -5C if in stronger wind.		
Freezing Level	Above the summits, may drop close to highest tops late in day, then lowering further to 800-900m overnight.		

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Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Thursday 13 November	Friday 14 November
How windy? (On the Munros) Effect of wind on you?	Northeasterly 50mph, gusts 60mph in places, lessening gradually during day to 35mph; then 25mph into night. Difficult conditions across the mountains, some improvement, but powerful gusts likely all day. Significant wind chill.	East-northeasterly, 25 to 35mph, to increasingly 40mph high tops, sudden downslope gusts; toward evening 50mph. Challenging walking conditions, frequent buffeting making balance difficult on higher terrain. Significant wind chill.
How wet?	Rain and hill snow fading	Local snow flurries east
(Precipitation and its impact)	Fairly persistent rain and hill snow above 700-800m from before dawn into morning, locally heavier, but easing off and gradually becoming patchy, then drier with time for most places into afternoon.	Snow flurries mostly on hills east of the A9, occasionally pushing westwards. Spots of rain into glens below 400-500m.
Cloud on the hills?	Fairly extensive, slowly improving	Most persistent eastern tops
	Shrouding most high ground from dawn, mostly above 800m but locally lower in east. Will tend to break into banks of cloud clinging to hills, perhaps briefly clearing tops, best breaks near Loch Tay afternoon.	Often covering the mountains around Glenshee to Lochnagar above 800-900m. Banks likely to cap many tops elsewhere above 900-1000m, some breaks westward.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30%	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, some bright breaks forming later in the day. Visibility variable: poor in snow/rain tending to improve.	Little or no sun. Visibility often poor eastern mountains, but very good below cloud and where often dry in central highlands.
How Cold? (at 900m)	0C, slightly lowering to -1C. Feeling like -15C in direct wind.	-2C (to -4C higher Munros). Wind chill feeling like -15C over higher terrain, or colder late in day.
Freezing Level	800-900m.	700m, but near to freezing on some lower slopes early morning.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Thursday, 13 November, 2025

High rainfall totals bring concerns for flooding again, risk more significant in Wales in the days ahead. A marked contrast of temperature north to south this week, but colder air to the north becomes more widespread into the weekend and early next week, leaving higher terrain below freezing for a run of days and some accumulating snow, mostly focused over northern Scottish mountains. Wind will vary, then become east-northeasterlies, gales Friday into Saturday, then a possible brief lull before turning northerly on Sunday. More uncertain outlook further into next week, but some further unsettled areas of low pressure currently show signs of remaining nearby - but often within a colder weather regime.
