## Southeastern Highlands



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## General Summary for Thursday, 13 November, 2025



# British Mountain Summary: Based on forecast chart for noon 13 November, 2025

Cold northeasterlies for the Highlands, gale-force over mountains early in day. Snow mostly in northern areas. A slow-moving swathe of rain for southern Scotland and northern England, heavy at times. Previous rain eases to patchy light rain in Wales, but beware of flooding - staying mild here.

## **Headline for Southeastern Highlands**

Cold, upland gales, lessening. Early rain & hill snow then drier.

## Detailed Forecast for Thursday, 13 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Northeasterly 50mph, gusts 60mph in places, lessening gradually during day to 35mph; then 25mph into night.	
Effect of wind on you?	Difficult conditions across the mountains, some improvement, but powerful gusts likely all day. Significant wind chill.	
How wet?	Rain and hill snow fading	
(Precipitation and its impact)	Fairly persistent rain and hill snow above 700-800m from before dawn into morning, locally heavier, but easing off and gradually becoming patchy, then drier with time for most places into afternoon.	
Cloud on the hills? Fairly extensive, slowly improving		
	Shrouding most high ground from dawn, mostly above 800m but locally lower in east. Will tend to break into banks of cloud clinging to hills, perhaps briefly clearing tops, best breaks near Loch Tay afternoon.	
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30%	
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Overcast, some bright breaks forming later in the day. Visibility variable: poor in snow/rain tending to improve.	
How Cold? (at 900m)	0C, slightly lowering to -1C. Feeling like -15C in direct wind.	
Freezing Level	800-900m.	

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#### Southeastern Highlands - Looking Ahead

	Friday 14 November	Saturday 15 November
How windy? (On the Munros)  Effect of wind on you?	East-northeasterly, 25 to 35mph, to increasingly 40mph high tops, sudden downslope gusts; toward dusk 50mph. Challenging walking conditions, frequent buffeting making balance difficult on higher terrain. Significant wind chill.	Easterly 40 to 50mph from dawn, very gusty in places toward west. Slowly decreasing, to 20-25mph late afternoon.  Expect challenging conditions and significant wind chill, risk much of day, but some improvement into afternoon.
How wet?	Local snow flurries east	Occasional flurries east
(Precipitation and its impact)	Snow flurries mostly on hills east of the A9, occasionally pushing westwards. Spots of rain into glens below 400-500m.	Often dry, but a few light snow flurries mainly over hills east of the A9.
Cloud on the hills?	Most persistent eastern tops	Most frequent on east-facing tops
	Often covering the mountains around Glenshee to Lochnagar above 800-900m. Banks likely to cap many tops elsewhere above 900-1000m, some breaks westward.	Patchy cloud mostly above 800-900m, most common over eastern hills, sometimes drifting onto tops west of Perth, but often clearing tops toward Lochs Tay and Rannoch.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30% east to 50% central areas	30% east, to 60% near Loch Tay.
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Little or no sun. Visibility reduced locally in flurries, but very good below cloud and where often dry in central highlands.	A little sun mostly westernmost areas. Visibility very good, some haze in east.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-2C (to -4C higher Munros). Wind chill feeling like -15C over higher terrain, or colder late in day.	-1C (to -3C on higher summits). Wind chill feeling like -15C in morning, -10C even into early afternoon.
Freezing Level	700m, but near to freezing on some lower slopes early morning.	Around 800m, local variations - some lower slopes near freezing in morning. May rise a little during day.

## **Planning Outlook**

#### All mountain areas of Britain from Friday, 14 November, 2025

High rainfall with significant flooding expected for Wales by the end of this week, risk flooding too in Peak District. Drier overall across the Highlands. Strong to gale force easterlies later this week, then northerlies are expected to dominate onward into next week. Colder air extends to all areas, staying below freezing over higher mountains most likely throughout next week to 10 days. Some accumulations of snow over Scottish mountains, initially mostly northern areas, possibly more widely across all mountain areas during next week - Tuesday-Wednesday in particular, but lower confidence of forecast detail by then.

#### Forecast issued at 16:30 on Wednesday, 12 November, 2025
