

Southeastern Highlands

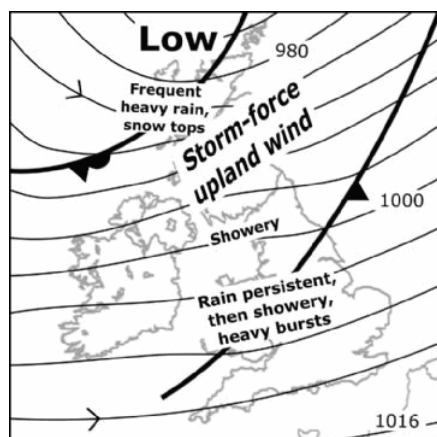
The southern Highlands as far west as the Callander area and north to Loch Erich, Drumochter and summits near Glenshee ski-centre (summits within the historic county of Perthshire). Also Ochils and Angus hills.



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General Summary for Friday, 28 November, 2025



British Mountain Summary:

Based on forecast chart for noon 28 November, 2025

Stormy conditions over Scottish mountains, easing only toward dusk; frequent or persistent rain and hill snow, heaviest western mountains. Severe gales high tops England & Wales, squally stormy gusts for a time with heavy bursts of rain. Risk of hail and isolated thunder, mainly western areas.

Headline for Southeastern Highlands

Stormy mountains winds most of day. Showery rain, snow tops.

Detailed Forecast for Friday, 28 November, 2025

How windy? (On the Munros)	Southwesterly 70 to 80mph, gusts over 90mph higher tops until early afternoon; peak speeds gradually lessening into the afternoon; from dusk dropping further toward 40mph, then less into night.
Effect of wind on you?	Extensively very difficult conditions with severe wind chill and buffeting - any mobility challenging mid-heights upward. Strong gusts into glens. Improving only beyond dusk.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Showers increasingly, snow upper slopes. Showers increasingly moving in. Most widely to hills west of the A9 during the afternoon. Falling as snow above 800m, possible hail in heavier bursts later. Few brief showers reaching hills east of Glenshee.
Cloud on the hills?	Often covering upper slopes Bases varying markedly, but extensively covering tops near and west of A9. More on and off tops elsewhere, down to 700-800m in showers.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	30%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Occasional sun, perhaps frequent in east. Visibility ranging from very good, to poor or very poor in showers.
How Cold? (at 900m)	0 or 1C. Wind chill feeling like -15 to -20C.
Freezing Level	900 to 1000m

	Saturday 29 November	Sunday 30 November
How windy? (On the Munros)	Northerly, 15 to 25mph, may increase to 30mph through day.	Northeasterly 10 to 20mph, but may drop light and variable. Then likely to strengthen southerly into night, risk 40-50mph.
Effect of wind on you?	Be prepared for significant wind chill in the north wind and some buffeting.	Marked wind chill in exposure for a time, but likely becoming small. Risk deteriorating onward into night.
How wet? (Precipitation and its impact)	Mostly dry Likely dry, bar isolated snow flurries in the north for a time.	Rare if any flurries Chance of an odd snow flurry areas near and east of Lochnagar.
Cloud on the hills?	Varying, mainly confined to tops. Cloud cover variable across area, but tending to come and go across higher tops in the north mostly.	Some local cloud banks, mainly east Patchy cloud around some higher slopes and corries, mainly more eastern mountains, tending to thin and break. Some mist around corries or into glens central highlands.
Chance of cloud free Munros?	60%	60%
Sunshine? Air clarity (below cloud)	Variable cloud and occasional sun. Visibility mostly very good.	Partly cloudy skies especially in east, some sunshine further south and west. Visibility excellent out of cloud.
How Cold? (at 900m)	-1 or -2C. Feeling like -10C if exposed to stronger wind.	-2C, small variation with height. Feeling nearer -10C if exposed to breeze.
Freezing Level	700 to 800m	Much terrain frozen with frost into glens, only partial thawing lowest sunlit slopes up to around 400-500m.

Planning Outlook

All mountain areas of Britain from Saturday, 29 November, 2025

Colder over the weekend with the mountains near or below freezing point, including frost into glens in Scotland by Saturday night. A small scale low on Saturday most likely affects England and Wales bringing rain , upland snow and a core of strong winds for a time. Sunday then mostly dry, bright and cold. Next week, Atlantic lows passing across or just north of Britain will bring frequent rainfall to western mountains together with upland gales. A mix of chilly westerly air and some milder southwesterlies. Freeze-thaw cycles, with periods of fresh snow mostly for Scottish hills, briefly high tops elsewhere.

Forecast issued at 7:00 on Friday, 28 November, 2025
